PAGE 4: Success Stories

Q15: Please relate a success story:

The success story (stories) include many litters of sick puppies (many without mothers), who were rehabilitated.

One specific case was of Rosie, a large mother dog who was found in a dumpster on the Navajo Reservation. She had no way out. A worker helped her out and it was discovered that she was very pregnant. The Heart and Soul Animal Sanctuary accepted her immediately and promptly drove her to the Smith Veterinary Hospital. There was concern of complications during delivery so she stayed at the hospital. Finally one evening, Rosie went into labor and delivered only one puppy. The vets knew there were 6 more so doses of oxytocin were administered. Still, no puppies, so at 4:30 AM, a C section was performed on Rosie. It took 3 veterinarians and 7 technicians to retrieve the 6 additional puppies. Rosie was so malnourished that, in spite of efforts to revive them, 5 of the puppies died. The surgery showed that Rosie did not have a good blood supply in her uterus due to her malnutrition, which was the reason the puppies did not survive.

Rosie came home to the Sanctuary to a beautiful private nursery and cared for her 2 surviving puppies. Then one day a wonderful family came to visit the Sanctuary and adopted Rosie and one of her puppies. (The other puppy was also adopted into a loving home). Without the freedom to provide Rosie with expert medical care, she would not have survived her pregnancy.

Q16: Please relate a success story here:

Another success story is the one about Stacia, a Chihuahua mix mother dog with 2 premature puppies who came to the Sanctuary as an abandoned dog. When one of her puppies died, she heard other puppies crying and went to look for her puppy. The mother of the puppies attacked her and broke her jaw. Stacia underwent a major procedure to have her jaw repaired and had to wear a mouthpiece that wired her jaw in place until it had time to heal. Later, Stacia's other puppy passed away and then she had nothing. All of the staff at the Sanctuary tried to give her special attention until she was adopted by one of the board members into a loving, forever home.

Again, without the funding for veterinarian care, Stacia may have had to be euthanized instead of finding a good home.
