Goal: To enhance park visitor safety and enjoyment as they explore Shenandoah National Park's trails on foot and by horseback.

Objective: This project improved the condition of 38 trails totaling 74 trail miles during the grant period, bringing each trail up to the standards set forth in the park's Backcountry and Wilderness Management Plan.

Activities:

- Removed over 130 fallen trees on these specific trails/roads
- Mowed and removed encroaching vegetation on 22 hiking and horse trails, plus an additional 15 administrative roads
- Cleaned and repaired 500 water control structures that prevent erosion on trails

Outcomes:

- Thousands of visitors who utilize these trails each year for hiking and horseback riding will have easier access to these trails and a more pleasant experience while on them.
- Visitor safety has been improved through the removal of hazardous trees, as well as the decrease in likelihood of visitor encounters with ticks that spread disease.
- The above activities will reduce the number of cultural and natural resources damaged by visitors who go off trail to avoid obstacles and obstructions.
- In the long-term, this project reduces the number of trails that deteriorate and are closed to visitor use.

Q10 Please describe any challenges/obstacles the organization encountered (if any) in attaining goals & objectives.

Weather is always a challenge with this top of work, but a more specific challenge arose when the park's Kubota tractor broke down while mowing one of the trails. The trail crew had no way of covering the cost of repairs at that time and this could've potentially set the project back by 3 months or more.

Q11 How did you overcome and/or address the challenges and obstacles?

The park and the Trust worked together to use project funding to pay for the repairs and get the work moving again with a minimal two week delay. To date, the tractor is operational and ready for the next project.

Q12 Describe any unintended positive outcomes as a result of the efforts supported by this grant.

As the trails crews were working along the trails and administrative roads funded by this project, they were also able to continue to make our Park beautiful by cleaning up and removing trash. They took a little extra time to remove trash such as cans and other metal pieces, food wrappers, and paper products. What made this extremely satisfying to the crew was not only removing items that littered our trails, but also recycling the materials.

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Q13 Briefly describe the impact this grant has had on the organization and community served.

As hiking gains in popularity, and visitation to our national parks continue to increase, projects like this are vital to ensuring our park's resources are protected and visitors have a safe and enjoyable experience. We've had the opportunity to take more people out on trails because of this grant, and made the trails more accessible to people of different abilities so that they can experience their national park in a new way.

Salaries - \$41,040 Supplies- \$500 Field Equipment & Repairs - \$8,460

An adjustment was made to the original budget to accommodate the needed repairs to the mowing equipment noted previously. In additional to funding trails crew staff, this grant made it possible for them to have all of the nexcessary field equipment including parts for chainsaws and weeders (air filters, sprockets, trimmer heads, chains, etc), replacement parts for hand tools (handles, swing blades, pruning saws, etc), and field safety equip (gloves, tick repellent, safety glasses, ear plugs).
