• Describe the project's key outcomes and results based on your goals and objectives. Provide the number of clients served and other relevant statistics.

Four sea containers were shipped from the Books For Africa warehouse in Atlanta, Georgia, USA to The Sierra Leone Book Trust (SALBOT) in Freetown, Sierra Leone from the period of December 2012 to September 2013 (please see four enclosed shipping document cover pages). Each container carried approximately 22,000 primary, secondary, and post-secondary books. The containers were transported to the SALBOT warehouse for sorting by Mr. Sallieu Turay, Director. Mr. Turay sorted the books and made them available to over 180 institutions across Sierra Leone that have the facilities and human resources necessary to make the books available for on-going use.

The books were targeted for three categories of recipients:

- 1) Universities- Sierra Leone has three principal universities: Fourah Bay College, founded in 1827 (the oldest university in West Africa), University of Makeni (established initially in September 2005 as The Fatima Institute, the college was granted university status in August 2009, and assumed the name University of Makeni, and Njala University in Bo District. Books to support the curriculums of these institutions were solicited by Professor Dick Simpson of the University of Illinois, Chicago, and shipped to the BFA warehouse for inclusion in all four containers.
- 2) School for Salone sites and rural schools (<u>www.schoolsforsalone.org</u>) The Sierra Leone Civil War resulted in the destruction of 1,270 primary schools, and in 2001, 67% of all school-age children were out of school. The situation has improved considerably since then with primary school enrolment doubling between 2001 and 2005 and the reconstruction of many schools since the end of the war (Wang, Lianqin (2007). *Education in Sierra Leone: Present Challenges, Future Opportunities.* World Bank Publications. p. 1 and 3).
 - Schools for Salone (SFS) is a charity based in Washington, U.S.A., with a mission of building schools and providing teacher and librarian training. Since 2005, Schools for Salone has built 15 primary school buildings and 2 secondary school libraries. SFS focuses on building schools in rural villages that are highly motivated to educate their children and that offer a high degree of participation in the construction and the maintenance of their schools. SFS first partnered with BFA in 2009, which started BFA's relationship with the Sierra Leone Book Trust, to whom BFA has now shipped eight containers of books.
- 3) U.S. Peace Corps (www.peacecorps.gov/learn/wherepc/africa/sierraleone) Primary education is free and compulsory in government-sponsored public schools, but a shortage of schools and teachers has made it impossible for all children to enroll in school. The U.S. Peace Corps pulled out of Sierra Leone in 1994, reentering in 2010. Currently 91 Peace Corps Volunteers (PCVs) serve in Sierra Leone, working in the education sector. The volunteers teach in rural schools where the government does not have sufficient teachers. The volunteers go to Freetown every few months, where they retrieve their boxes at the Peace Corps office to truck back to their schools.

• What were the challenges and obstacles you encountered (if any) in attaining your goals & objectives? How did you overcome and/or address the challenges and obstacles? What were the lessons learned?

The major barrier to distributing books throughout the country is the condition of the roads and the price of gas. Given these travel barriers, in some cases boxes were received in the SALBOT warehouse for sites that were not able to send someone to come pick them up right away. Mr. Turay has limited warehouse space that needs to be cleared out before he can accept the next container. The Peace Corps office intervened by sending their truck to take the boxes earmarked for PCVs until they could get into Freetown. Professor Dick Simpson of Chicago intervened by wiring funds to Mr. Turay ahead of each container arrival so that he had gas money to bring boxes to the recipients.

In the future, Professor Simpson will be fundraising to supplement the shipping charges of each container so that Mr. Turay is supplied with funds towards the distribution.

• Describe any unintended positive outcomes as a result of the efforts supported by this grant.

After receiving the Gimbel Grant, BFA learned that Ms. Valerie Staats, Former Director of the International Book Bank, had been reassigned from Peace Corps Director in Cape Verde to Peace Corps Country Director, Sierra Leone. Ms. Staats coordinated a wonderful book distribution ceremony, including Mr. Turay and the Ambassador of the U.S. to Sierra Leone. Ms. Staats serves as a Books For Africa Ambassador Circle member and delivered photos of the ceremony (please see enclosed).

An additional positive outcome is that Mr. Turay's reputation has been elevated throughout the country as the "bearer of books", and he is being sought out by school directors, as demonstrated by this recent appeal:

• Describe the overall effect this grant has had on your organization.

The shipment of four containers over the last year has maintained Sierra Leone as a high priority on our shipping schedule. BFA and SFS have a mission of delivering one million books to Sierra Leone, in order to populate schools across the country that aim to enroll the estimated 2.5 million youth. Overall, the effect of this grant has delivered books to more than 180 schools and universities that had little or no books.

Providing books to under resourced schools helps offset educational costs for families that do not have reading material to supplement their children's school lessons. The provision of a variety of reading material also helps retains students who did not before have a "reading culture" that encouraged them to pursue their interests and attain a higher education. Although the number of children in primary education has greatly doubled between 2001 and 2005, in 2010, there were still over 281,100 school-aged children not in primary school (UNESCO). Continuing to provide books to support rural teachers with large classes and to attract and entertain students is BFA's top priority in Sierra Leone.
