# CLARE Foundation Application to the S.L. Gimbel Foundation Fund April 2014

I. Organization Background: CLARE Foundation is a nonprofit organization providing effective and compassionate treatment, recovery, and prevention services for alcoholism and substance abuse to individuals, families, and the community. Founded in 1970, CLARE has its origins in the late 1960s when a group of sober alcoholics began bringing food, blankets, and the message of recovery to homeless alcoholics on the beaches of Santa Monica and Venice. Since then, CLARE has evolved into a multi-site organization with nine highly effective and cost-efficient residential, outpatient, and prevention programs. These programs are Admissions; Primary Program; Men's Recovery Home; Women's Treatment Program; Sober Living Centers; Women with Children Sober Living Program; Intensive Outpatient; Clarity for Youth; and Conscious Recovery, a sustainable outpatient program tailored to mid-market clients, which opened in January 2014.

Through this continuum of care, CLARE serves more than 3,000 adults and 1,600 young people each year, and offers information, counseling, and referrals to another 27,000. Our clients come from all over Los Angeles County and beyond. Our client base is 69% male and 31% female. Its demographic breakdown is 54% Caucasian, 14.4% African-American, 24.7% Hispanic, 3.4 % Asian, 1.5% Native American, and 2% other. Approximately 65% of CLARE's clients are self-identified as homeless at the time of their admission, and many more are indigent.

As an organization, CLARE has spent the several years preparing for the changes that healthcare reform will bring to our sector by improving our infrastructure and increasing our capacity for sustainability. In December 2012, we opened a new 40-bed facility for our Women's Treatment Program. In addition, we are preparing for a \$3.15 million renovation of our largest residential facility. We are also increasing our organizational sustainability by developing ways for our current programs to generate operating revenue through self-payment and insurance, and by designing a sustainable program—Conscious Recovery—that is geared toward self-supporting individuals who can pay for their treatment through insurance or personal funds. We have also undertaken several initiatives designed to improve our infrastructure, including upgrading our phone system, a step that will help us eliminate dropped calls; improving our system of electronic health records; and undergoing an accreditation process with CARF, which is an essential step toward going in-network with insurance providers.

II. Project Information: According to a 2013 report from the Centers for Disease Control, approximately 14 million American women currently abuse alcohol. Nearly half of these women are considered alcoholics, and females are the fastest growing segment of the alcoholic population. Accompanying this rise in alcoholism in women are the often unseen consequences of alcohol abuse, including unplanned pregnancies, sexually transmitted diseases, and interpersonal violence. Although these statistics are alarming on their own, they take on added significance when considered in light of the fact that, according to the federal Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, 6.9 million women in the US need but are not receiving treatment for addictions of all types.

In recognition of the need for low-barrier substance abuse treatment for women, CLARE offers the Women's Treatment Program (WTP), an effective and accessible continuum of care that includes detoxification, primary care, and three to six months of residential treatment to 275 women each year. Upon entrance into WTP, clients work with counselors to create their own program course, which includes alcohol and drug education and counseling, behavioral health resources, and supplementary program components such as yoga, meditation, anger management, relapse prevention, and family reunification workshops. Counselors also help clients address ongoing housing, legal, family, and domestic violence issues that could pose a threat to their recovery.

Our overall goal is for clients in our Women's Treatment Program to recover from substance abuse by gaining and maintaining sobriety and finding employment and housing as they move forward to create stable and fulfilling lives. We plan to track progress toward this goal through the following objectives, which will be furthered by the attendant activities:

- Objective 1: During their up-to-six-month stay, 80% of the women served by this program will maintain sobriety.
- <u>Activities:</u> Counselors will work with clients to develop personalized treatment plans and monitor clients' sobriety.
- Objective 2: Upon completion of their program, 80% of the women served by this program will have secured housing for themselves.
- <u>Activities:</u> Upon entry into the program, clients will begin working with CLARE's housing specialist to find affordable, accessible housing options, including CLARE's Sober Living Centers.
- Objective 3: Upon program completion, 80% of the women served will either have found permanent employment or have entered into a degree or training program.
- <u>Activities</u>: Clients will work with counselors, volunteers, and staff at partner agencies to undergo job-search training, including resume-writing and interviewing workshops, and to investigate resources for continuing education.

We measure our progress toward our overall goal and these objectives, as well as the Program's impact on the lives of our clients, using a variety of methods. Client abstinence is measured through random urinalysis testing for banned substances, including alcohol, illicit drugs, and unapproved medications. Residents' progress toward obtaining housing, employment, and/or continuing education is monitored by counselors and CLARE's housing specialist, each of whom hold regular meetings to measure clients' progress against markers laid out in their treatment plans. Housing, employment, and education status of graduates is monitored by follow-up interviews with counselors and the housing specialist. CLARE also collects feedback on program effectiveness directly from clients and former clients on an ongoing basis through periodic client focus groups, Resident Council meetings that offer suggestions to program staff, and quarterly Client Advisory meetings, in which select clients speak to board and staff about their experiences with the Women's Treatment Program. We will know if we have achieved the expected outcomes if 80% of the women graduating from the Program attain our three markers for success: sobriety, housing, and employment or education.

The Women's Treatment Program serves addicted women over the age of 18. Each year, the program treats and houses 275 adult women, approximately 21% of whom are ages 18-24, 78% of whom are ages 25-60, and 1% of whom are over age 60. All Women's Treatment Program clients participate in the programmatic and supplemental activities described above.

Although the Women's Treatment Program is a unique resource in Santa Monica, CLARE as an organization is a pivotal part of a community safety net of social services. We are a primary substance abuse treatment provider in the Westside Shelter and Hunger Coalition, which is composed of over 30 social service providers. Longtime partnerships with other organizations, including Chrysalis Foundation, Didi Hirsch Mental Center, OPCC, St. Joseph Center, Venice Family Clinic, and the Westside Food Bank, allow us to offer a wide variety of additional services and resources to our clients. Volunteers, who are critical to CLARE's ongoing success, often assist counselors by facilitating 12-Step meetings, or by offering supplementary client enrichment activities such as art therapy and financial literacy.

The Women's Treatment Program is delivered throughout the course of CLARE's fiscal year (July 1 – June 30), and consistently runs a budget deficit. If awarded, funds from the S.L. Gimbel Foundation Fund would help support the salaries of our program staff, who deliver all of the program services described above, and are either certified drug and alcohol counselors or working towards certification. Grant funds would also support shelter and meals for clients.

#### III. Project Future

The Women's Treatment Program is a year-round program funded through CLARE's operating budget, client fees, and donations from private funders.

## IV. Governance, Executive Leadership, and Key Personnel/Staff Qualifications

CLARE's work is led by Executive Director Nicholas Vrataric, who holds an MBA from the University of Michigan and has over two decades of experience in the nonprofit sector. The Executive Director is supported by a leadership team that includes a Senior Director of Finance and Operations, a Senior Director of Development, a Senior Director of Conscious Recovery, a Senior Director of Pico Recovery, and a Director of Clinical Services—all of whom have extensive experience in addiction treatment and nonprofit governance. The Women's Treatment Program is overseen by the Women's Residential Manager, who is certified as an Addiction Specialist by the California Association of Addiction Recovery Resources; she has been with CLARE for seven years.

The work of CLARE's leadership and program staff is overseen by CLARE's 21 volunteer board members, who represent the entertainment, business, health, philanthropic, law, and civic communities. Board members serve on committees that include Executive, Facilities, Finance and Investment, Governance, Major Gifts, Programs and Planning, and Resource and Development. These committees meet regularly with key staff to keep apprised of relevant issues, and board members vote on high-level decisions at bimonthly board meetings.

Dear Sir or Madam:

This letter is in response to your request for a copy of your organization's determination letter. This letter will take the place of the copy you requested.

Our records indicate that a determination letter issued in October 1970, granted your organization exemption from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. That letter is still in effect.

Based on information subsequently submitted, we classified your organization as one that is not a private foundation within the meaning of section 509(a) of the Code because it is an organization described in section 509(a)(2).

This classification was based on the assumption that your organization's operations would continue as stated in the application. If your organization's sources of support, or its character, method of operations, or purposes have changed, please let us know so we can consider the effect of the change on the exempt status and foundation status of your organization.

Your organization is required to file Form 990, Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax, only if its gross receipts each year are normally more than \$25,000. If a return is required, it must be filed by the 15th day of the fifth month after the end of the organization's annual accounting period. The law imposes a penalty of \$20 a day, up to a maximum of \$10,000, when a return is filed late, unless there is reasonable cause for the delay.

All exempt organizations (unless specifically excluded) are liable for taxes under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act (social security taxes) on remuneration of \$100 or more paid to each employee during a calendar year. Your organization is not liable for the tax imposed under the Federal Unemployment Tax Act (FUTA).

Organizations that are not private foundations are not subject to the excise taxes under Chapter 42 of the Code. However, these organizations are not automatically exempt from other federal excise taxes.

Donors may deduct contributions to your organization as provided in section 170 of the Code. Bequests, legacies, devises, transfers, or gifts to your organization or for its use are deductible for federal estate and gift tax purposes if they meet the applicable provisions of sections 2055, 2106, and 2522 of the Code.

Your organization is not required to file federal income tax returns unless it is subject to the tax on unrelated business income under section 511 of the Code. If your organization is subject to this tax, it must file an income tax return on the Form 990-T, Exempt Organization Business Income Tax Return. In this letter, we are not determining whether any of your organization's present or proposed activities are unrelated trade or business as defined in section 513 of the Code.

The law requires you to make your organization's annual return available for public inspection without charge for three years after the due date of the return. If your organization had a copy of its application for recognition of exemption on July 15, 1987, it is also required to make available for public inspection a copy of the exemption application, any supporting documents and the exemption letter to any individual who requests such documents in person or in writing. You can charge only a reasonable fee for reproduction and actual postage costs for the copied materials. The law does not require you to provide copies of public inspection documents that are widely available, such as by posting them on the Internet (World Wide Web). You may be liable for a penalty of \$20 a day for each day you do not make these documents available for public inspection (up to a maximum of \$10,000 in the case of an annual return).

Because this letter could help resolve any questions about your organization's exempt status and foundation status, you should keep it with the organization's permanent records.

Requests for variances or extensions are reviewed on a case-by-case basis and approved by the Board of Directors. If a request is denied, unused funds must be immediately refunded to the Foundation.

## 2. Payment of Grant Funds

The grant funds will be paid in full by the Foundation upon receipt of the signed Grant Agreement. Challenge grant funds will be paid in full upon receipt of the signed Grant Agreement and upon receipt of documentation providing evidence that condition(s) of the challenge grant has/have been met.

# 3. Certification and Maintenance of Exempt Organization Status

This grant is specifically conditioned upon Grantee's status as an eligible grantee of The Community Foundation. The Foundation has obtained a copy of the Grantee's IRS determination letter. Grantee confirms that it has not had any change in its tax-exempt status, and shall notify the Foundation immediately of any such change.

# 4. Final Report and Records
