I. ORGANIZATIONAL BACKGROUND: TARGET POPULATION

There are 257,492 households and a population of 610,613 in Oklahoma City. National statistics show that 62% of American households own a pet and that 80% of them will acquire their pet from a source other than an animal shelter or rescue organization. Using this data, an estimated 160,000 Oklahoma City homes have pets, of which a projected 31,929 have come from animal shelters or rescue organizations.

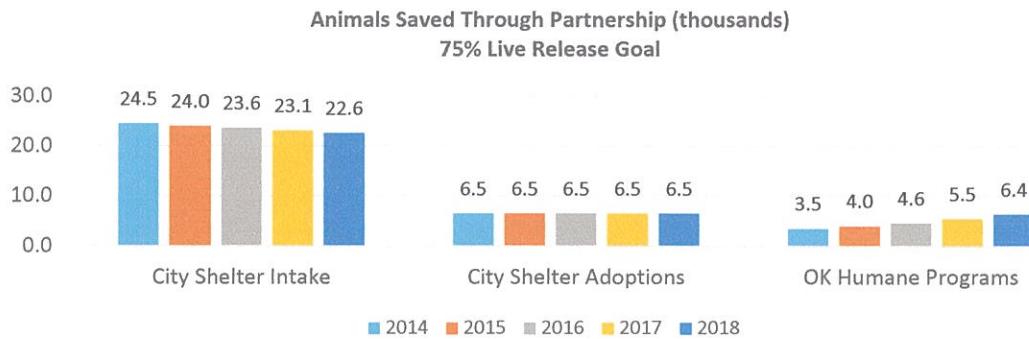
The Oklahoma City Animal Shelter is the primary sheltering organization in Oklahoma City. As a governmental agency, the City Shelter is required to serve all animals within Oklahoma City limits including, strays, owner-relinquished pets, animals impounded for cruelty and neglect and animals that present a threat to society due to health or aggressive behavior. The Oklahoma City Animal Shelter admitted 25,060 animals in 2013. Of that total, 56% were adopted, returned to their owners or transferred to other animal welfare agencies and 44% were euthanized. On average, the City Animal Shelter adopts 550-600 animals into new homes per month. Limiting issues are the volume of intake, coupled with budget constraints and reticence by a large part of the public to visit municipal shelters because they are perceived to be “depressing” and overwhelming.

The Central Oklahoma Humane Society (OK Humane) was founded in 2007 to end the needless euthanasia of adoptable animals at the City Animal Shelter and to work toward creating a more compassionate community in Oklahoma City. Since 2007, more than 75,000 pets have been saved or assisted by OK Humane programs. Our goal is, in partnership with the Oklahoma City Animal Shelter, to be able to save all of the adoptable animals entering the City Animal Shelter by the end of 2018.

OK Humane is the largest private animal welfare organization in Oklahoma City. Since inception, OK Humane has partnered with the Oklahoma City Animal Shelter to transfer animals from the shelter into its program. Under this partnership, both organizations are committed to working toward a collaborative live-release rate of 75%.

Great progress has been made since 2007. Adoptions have increased almost 100% from 4,834 per year in 2007 to 9,609 in 2013. Live-release rate has also climbed, up from 25.3% in 2007 to 56.9% in 2013. Over this time period, OK Humane found homes for more than 13,000 pets through its adoption program alone.

Currently, about 60% of the animals transferred out of the City Shelter enter OK Humane’s programs. Assuming the City Shelter continues its historical annual adoption rate of about 6,500 animals per year and the rate of intake declines by 2% annually, to achieve the 75% live release rate goal, OK Humane will need to increase the number of animals transferred into its programs by 15% per year over a 5-year period, essentially doubling the number of animals in its care by the end of 2018.



There are four primary programs in addition to the Adoption Program:

Spay & Neuter: OK Humane began providing spay and neuter services in 2008 using existing facilities. In 2009, it opened the OK Humane Place Spay & Neuter Clinic, a high-volume clinic designed to provide low-cost services to the public. OK Humane Place is a high volume/high quality clinic offering substantially reduced pricing. Since 2008, the clinic has performed 65,421 surgeries.

Relocation: In 2013, the City Animal Shelter took in 16,000 adult dogs and puppies. Of that, 38% were euthanized. To increase the number of dogs saved, the OK Humane Homeward Bound Relocation Program transfers adult dogs and puppies to shelters in other communities where they can be guaranteed a home. To date, this program has saved the lives of almost 2,000 dogs and puppies that would very likely have otherwise been euthanized.

Trap/Neuter/Return and Community Cats: There are an estimated 98,000 free-roaming cats in the Oklahoma City metropolitan area. OK Humane introduced a Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) program in 2007, focusing on cats living on the street and considered to be unadoptable. In 2012, OK Humane introduced the Community Cat Program, with a goal of providing an additional safety net for cats entering the Oklahoma City Animal Shelter. The Community Cat Program addresses **all** cats living on the street, even if they are tame. Combined, the TNR and Community Cat programs have saved almost 9,000 cats since 2007.

Humane Education: Designed to educate the public and create a generation of humane and responsible children, the OK Humane Education programs have touched the lives of more than 2,500 children.

II. PROJECT INFORMATION

OK Humane has experienced explosive growth this year and is currently trending 34% ahead of the 3,000 adoptions projected for 2014. A Leadership transition and marketing and operational modifications made early in 2014 have enhanced historically strong performance, and the renovation and grand re-opening of the Adoption Center in October will further drive adoptions, resulting in a projected total of 4,000 adoptions by year end. For every pet placed into a home, OK Humane incurs a net loss of \$52.20 (hard costs/no direct or indirect overhead), so the overall

impact to the budget of a 34% increase in adoptions is \$52,200. A grant of \$25,000 from the Gimbel Foundation would subsidize 480 of the 1,000 incremental adoptions projected for 2014.

Achieving 4,000 adoptions will accelerate momentum toward the achievement of a 75% live release rate. Offsetting net loss from the incremental adoptions will enable OK Humane to balance its 2014 budget while at the same achieving the amazing task of having saved a significantly greater number of lives.

III. PROJECT FUTURE

The 2015 Financial Budget will be built on the expectation that OK Humane will increase adoptions by 15% over 2014 actuals. Fundraising efforts will continue to support the strong growth of the adoption program. The organization's quantifiable progress and growing impact in saving the lives of homeless pets has been positively received by donors and funders and it is anticipated that support for the adoption program will continue to grow.

IV. GOVERNANCE, EXECUTIVE LEADERSHIP AND KEY PERSONNEL/STAFF QUALIFICATIONS

The OK Humane board is comprised of twenty board directors, and five committees; Executive, Governance, Development, Finance and Education. The board meets every two months, with committee meetings in between. The board is actively involved in strategy, fundraising (100% vested) and committee work. Activity is vetted at the committee level and discussed/approved by the board at the scheduled board meetings.

In January of 2014, Susana M. Della Maddalena assumed the role of President and CEO from the organization's founder, Christy Counts. Susana joined OK Humane from PetSmart Charities, where as Executive Director, she oversaw the organization's grant-making and fundraising activities for ten years. She grew PetSmart Charities from \$8M to more than \$40M in annual income and oversaw the development of a five-year strategy that has facilitated the adoption of more than 5M pets and the sterilization of more than 1.7 million dogs and cats.

Samantha Burnett, Vice President of Operations, has been with OK Humane since 2007 and has been responsible for the implementation of the highly acclaimed TNR and Adoption programs and the opening of the in-house medical clinic and OK Humane Place, the Organization's spay/neuter clinic. Sam brings a wealth of expertise in animal care and people management.

Angie Broadhead, Adoption Center Manager, joined OK Humane in 2012. Angie has been involved in animal rescue as a volunteer for almost 30 years. Prior to joining OK Humane she was a successful real estate broker for more than ten years. Angie brings an empathetic heart coupled with strong people and customer service skills and business acumen.

Amy Shrodes, Director of Marketing & Development, joined OK Humane in 2007. Amy is an accomplished marketer, event planner and social media wizard. She has been responsible for helping OK Humane acquire a fan base of more than 30,000 followers, and has planned and executed the highly successful Midnight Woofness Adoption Event now being employed by other organizations around the country. She has run the Adoption Center, led in disaster and cruelty response efforts and helped grow the OK Humane fundraising program.

Purpose: Fall Adoption Drive: Subsidize the placement of 480 cats and dogs for adoption.

1. Use of Grant Funds

Grant funds must be expended within the grant period, for the purpose and objectives described in your grant proposal. Grant funds may not be expended for any other purpose without prior written approval by The Community Foundation. If there are significant difficulties in making use of the funds as specified in your proposal, or if the grant funds cannot be spent within the grant period, notify us in writing promptly.

Formal requests for extensions or variances must be submitted to the Foundation's Board of Directors for approval a minimum of 60 days before the end of the grant period.

Requests for variances or extensions are reviewed on a case-by-case basis and approved by the Board of Directors. If a request is denied, unused funds must be immediately refunded to the Foundation.

2. Payment of Grant Funds

The grant funds will be paid in full by the Foundation upon receipt of the signed Grant Agreement. Challenge grant funds will be paid in full upon receipt of the signed Grant Agreement and upon receipt of documentation providing evidence that condition(s) of the challenge grant has/have been met.

3. Certification and Maintenance of Exempt Organization Status

This grant is specifically conditioned upon Grantee's status as an eligible grantee of The Community Foundation. The Foundation has obtained a copy of the Grantee's IRS determination letter. Grantee confirms that it has not had any change in its tax-exempt status, and shall notify the Foundation immediately of any such change.

4. Final Report and Records

The Grantee will submit the Grant Evaluation report per the deadline set forth in the award letter. This report includes a narrative on outcomes based on goals and objectives set forth in the grant proposal and an expenditure report documenting use of grant funds. If equipment was purchased, copies of receipts need to be included.

5. Grantee's Financial Responsibilities

Grantee will keep records of receipts and expenditures of grant funds and other supporting documentation related to the grant at least four (4) years after completion of the grant and will make such records of receipts, expenditures and supporting documentation available to the Foundation upon request.

6. Publicity

The Community Foundation recommends publicity for the grant and acknowledging The Community Foundation in internal correspondence, brochures as appropriate; newsletters, annual reports and email blasts or e-newsletters.

7. Indemnification

In the event that a claim of any kind is asserted against the Grantee or the Foundation related to or arising from the project funded by the Grant and a proceeding is brought against the Foundation by reason of such claim, the Grantee, upon written notice from the Foundation, shall, at the Grantee's expense, resist or defend such action or proceeding, at no cost to the Foundation, by counsel approved by the Foundation in writing.

Grantee hereby agrees, to the fullest extent permitted by law, to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the Foundation, its offices, directors, employees, and agents, from and against any and all claims, liabilities, losses, and expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees) directly, indirectly, wholly, or partially arising from or in connection with any act or omission by Grantee, its employees, or agents in applying for or accepting the Grant, in expending or applying the Grant funds or in carrying out any project or program supported by the Grant, except to the extent that such claims, liabilities, losses, and expenses arise from or in connection with any bad faith act or omission by the Foundation, its officers, directors, employees, or agent.

8. Termination

The Community Foundation may terminate this agreement, withhold payments, or both at any time, if, in the Community Foundation's judgment: a) The Community Foundation is not satisfied with the quality of the Grantee's progress toward achieving the project goals and objectives; b) the Grantee dissolves or fails to operate; c) the Grantee fails to comply with the terms and conditions of this agreement.

9. Limitation of Support

This Agreement contains the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the Grant and supersedes any previous oral or written understandings or agreements.
