IX. <u>Organization/Agency Background</u>: State your mission, vision, purpose, and provide a brief history. What are your core programs and activities? How many people do you serve? How many paid staff, full time and part-time? How many volunteers?

Community Food Bank is Central California's largest nonprofit organization dedicated solely to ending hunger in the Central Valley. Our mission is to fight hunger by gathering and distributing food, engaging in partnerships that advance self-sufficiency, and by providing community leadership on issues related to hunger. We serve 280,000 people each month, including 90,000 children, throughout Fresno, Madera, Tulare, Kings, and Kern Counties. Through these efforts, we envision a hunger-free Central California.

Community Food Bank began in 1992 with a small group of men and women who were dedicated to seeing that people in their community did not go hungry. They started gathering and storing food in a small warehouse at the Fresno Fairgrounds. Twenty-five years later, the organization has grown exponentially, providing 40 million pounds of food to families, children, and seniors last year. We employ 43 full-time staff and utilize over 4,000 volunteers every year.

We provide food to people in need through our direct service programs as well as a pantry program in collaboration with our community partners. Our direct services include a children's BackPack program providing 700 elementary school children a backpack of food every Friday; Neighborhood Market and Mobile Pantry fresh produce distributions; CalFresh Outreach program which assists families in applying for federal food assistance; and USDA Emergency Food Assistance program which provides shelf-stable goods throughout Fresno County. Through our Pantry Program, we provide food to over 220 partner agencies throughout the Central Valley who distribute food on our behalf.

Community Food Bank aims to serve low-income families with children, seniors, immigrants, veterans, and college students who are under-served and disadvantaged by poverty, food insecurity, and the lack of access to healthy foods. We distribute food in specific neighborhoods designated as low-income census tracts by the U.S. Census Bureau in order to make the greatest impact.

II. <u>Project Information</u>: Describe your food distribution program. Our Holiday Meal Box program provides families in need with a box of high-quality foods to make a complete holiday meal. The boxes include green beans, gravy, stuffing, Mac & Cheese, mixed fruit, rice, beans, cranberry sauce, potato flakes, pudding, cake mix, and a whole frozen chicken. We distribute the boxes through our partner agencies, which provide them to families during the holidays. Each partner agency receives an amount of boxes based on the number of people they typically serve.

We provide these robust meal boxes to families in Fresno, Madera, Tulare, Kings, and Kern Counties. Ironically, one of the top agriculture-producing regions in the nation also has one of the highest levels of food insecurity. In fact, the Fresno region has the fifth highest food hardship rate in the nation, as ranked by the Food Research and Action Center. One in four adults and one in three children in the Central Valley do not have sufficient access to food. The region suffers from chronically high unemployment and poverty. Unemployment recently hit 9.5% - twice that of both state and national averages, and 25% of the population lives below the federal poverty level.

This year, we will distribute a total of 20,000 holiday meal boxes to food-insecure families in Central California, serving thousands of children, youth, adults, and seniors who are struggling with hunger. Each year, the USDA provides us with enough food products for 10,000 meal boxes to distribute in Fresno County only. We use our general operating funds to purchase food for 10,000 additional meal boxes to distribute throughout Madera, Tulare, Kings, and Kern Counties. At a cost of \$15.50 per box, a \$10,000 grant from the S.L. Gimbel Foundation Fund would cover the cost of 645 holiday meal boxes that will feed families in need this season.

This letter is in response to your request for a copy of your organization's determination letter. This letter will take the place of the copy you requested.

Our records indicate that a determination letter issued in January 1997 granted your organization exemption from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. That letter is still in effect.

Based on information subsequently submitted, we classified your organization as one that is not a private foundation within the meaning of section 509(a) of the Code because it is an organization described in sections 509(a)(1) and 170(b)(1)(A)(vi).

This classification was based on the assumption that your organization's operations would continue as stated in the application. If your organization's sources of support, or its character, method of operations, or purposes have changed, please let us know so we can consider the effect of the change on the exempt status and foundation status of your organization.

Your organization is required to file Form 990, Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax, only if its gross receipts each year are normally more than \$25,000. If a return is required, it must be filed by the 15th day of the fifth month after the end of the organization's annual accounting period. The law imposes a penalty of \$20 a day, up to a maximum of \$10,000, when a return is filed late, unless there is reasonable cause for the delay.

All exempt organizations (unless specifically excluded) are liable for taxes under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act (social security taxes) on remuneration of \$100 or more paid to each employee during a calendar year. Your organization is not liable for the tax imposed under the Federal Unemployment Tax Act (FUTA).

Organizations that are not private foundations are not subject to the excise taxes under Chapter 42 of the Code. However, these organizations are not automatically exempt from other federal excise taxes.

Donors may deduct contributions to your organization as provided in section 170 of the Code. Bequests, legacies, devises, transfers, or gifts to your organization or for its use are deductible for federal estate and gift tax purposes if they meet the applicable provisions of sections 2055, 2106, and 2522 of the Code.

Your organization is not required to file federal income tax returns unless it is subject to the tax on unrelated business income under section 511 of the Code. If your organization is subject to this tax, it must file an income tax return on the Form 990-T, Exempt Organization Business income Tax Return. In this letter, we are not determining whether any of your organization's present or proposed activities are unrelated trade or business as defined in section 513 of the Code.

The law requires you to make your organization's annual return available for public inspection without charge for three years after the due date of the return. You are also required to make available for public inspection a copy of your organization's exemption application, any supporting documents and the exemption letter to any individual who requests such documents in person or in writing. You can charge only a reasonable fee for reproduction and actual postage costs for the copied materials. The law does not require you to provide copies of public inspection documents that are widely available, such as by posting them on the internet (World Wide Web). You may be liable for a penalty of \$20 a day for each day you do not make these documents available for public inspection (up to a maximum of \$10,000 in the case of an annual return).

Because this letter could help resolve any questions about your organization's exempt status and foundation status, you should keep it with the organization's permanent records.
