XXIV. Organization/Agency Background: State your mission, vision, purpose, and provide a brief history. What are your core programs and activities? How many people do you serve? How many paid staff, full time and part-time? How many volunteers?

Fulfill (The FoodBank of Monmouth and Ocean Counties) was created in 1984 to alleviate hunger and build food security in Monmouth and Ocean Counties. Our vision is for our area to be a food secure community where all people at all times have access to enough nutritious food to maintain an active and healthy life. We take a comprehensive approach to fighting hunger by fulfilling the greater needs of our neighbors who are hungry and helping them become more financially stable. Our primary service is the provision of 12 million meals a year to more than 131,600 individuals, including 40,000 children, through a network of 300 programs such as food pantries, soup kitchens, shelters, senior and youth programs. We also have several direct delivery programs such as our Youth Meal Programs that serve kids attending after school programs and summer recreation programs, a weekend food backpack program, a Mobile Pantry which incorporates fresh produce from our organic garden, and Senior Food Boxes that are delivered to public housing residents. However, hunger cannot be remedied by food alone. Therefore, Fulfill also addresses the root cause of hunger, which is poverty. We offer a 13-week Culinary Job Training Program to low-income adults to help them gain sustainable employment. Our Resource Connection team also assists eligible individuals in applying for SNAP, accessing affordable healthcare, and receiving free tax preparation. We currently have two locations (Neptune and Toms River) so we can better meet the needs of all of the individuals in our service area. Thanks to our growth, we now employ 46 full-time and 5 part-time staff and utilize more than 4,500 volunteers who help with our daily operations.

II. <u>Project Information</u>: Describe your food distribution program. Explain the community need including demographics, geographic characteristics of the area or community to be served, community conditions and income level. What are the specific activities of the food program? How do you identify/qualify those in need? How often is the food distribution offered? How many people will be served by the food distribution program (children, youth, adults, seniors)? Please explain how you keep track of number of people served.

The need for food assistance has grown since 2008, due to the recession and Superstorm Sandy. Fulfill distributes 12.4 million pounds annually, including 3 million pounds of produce, which is a 68% increase from 2008. This is due to economic reasons (job loss, divorce, disability, or part-time employment) and environmental ones (lack of affordable housing, limited transportation) that leave people unable to consistently meet their living expenses. Without help, many individuals have to choose between buying food and their other expenses (rent, medicine), which can lead to malnutrition, eviction, poor health, and debt. Fulfill helps families by handling their immediate needs, while helping them establish a stronger financial foundation.

Almost 55% of our food comes from retail stores, food manufacturers, and food drives. Another 40% comes from government programs and 5% is purchased. We also grow more than 2,500 pounds of produce on-site. All food is sorted for safety, nutritionally-rated, and entered into our database. Our programs place their online orders and arrange for regularly scheduled delivery or pick-up based on their program size. We also offer a Mobile Pantry, Backpack Program, Senior Food Program, Summer Food Program, and After School Meals to target specific at-risk individuals (seniors and children)

Clients self-refer and appear at programs according to need, although we do also receive referrals. Everyone receives food on a first-come, first-served basis and the amount is based on what is available at the program at the time. Some clients receive assistance on a regular basis to supplement their fixed incomes, however, many families only need food for a short time. Anyone living at or below 185% of the Federal Poverty Level is eligible for assistance and we utilize Ceres and Oasis software programs to track the number of clients, our services, and the amount of food we distribute.

For the purchase of 6#10 cans for our soup kitchens Grant Period: December 1, 2016 to June 30, 2017

Total number of clients served through this grant: 8,554 (duplicated)

Approximate volume of food purchased: We purchased 323 cases of #10 cans of crushed tomatoes (six 58.68 ounces cans in each case) and 194 cases of #10 cans of chocolate pudding (6 58.68 ounce cans in each case). This totaled 11,377 pounds of food and approximately 8,554 meals.

Describe the project's key outcomes and results based on your goals and objectives:

Our plan was to use this funding to support our Monmouth and Ocean County programs that prepare and provide communal meals. These programs prepare large-scale, congregate meals for shelter clients, soup kitchen patrons, and day program participants. The most time-effective and cost-effective way for them to prepare these meals is to use #10 cans of ingredients, each of which contains 58.68 ounces of food. However, neither the programs nor Fulfill receives donations of #10 cans, so the programs instead must procure dozens of cans of each item that is needed to create the meals, which can be challenging, not only to get but to use (imagine opening 20 cans of tuna instead of just 1). Therefore, Fulfill used funding from the S.L. Gimbel Fund to purchase #10 cans of the items that are most frequently requested by our congregate meal programs for meal production and distributed them to programs in Monmouth and Ocean Counties.

Describe any unintended positive outcomes due to this grant: If the agencies that need #10 cans had to procure them themselves, they would cost a lot more because they would only be ordering a small amount, rather than a bulk order that comes with better pricing. By allowing Fulfill to order a large amount of the items and distribute them to the multiple programs that need them, we were able to secure a greatly discounted price for the items. This allows the programs to get the items they need without using money from their own limited budgets in an ineffective way.

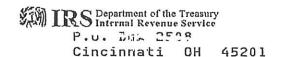
Describe the impact that this grant has had on your organization: The ability to purchase these items has strengthened the relationships we have with our feeding programs. Many programs need these products but they don't have the budget to purchase them. The grant allowed us to better serve them, which ultimately serves our community better, by giving them the tools they need to do their jobs in a better, more efficient manner. It has also allowed us to help pantries who have clients with large families (multi-generational or a large number of children). If pantries have a small inventory of #10 cans, they can give them out to their large families, instead of depleting their inventory of smaller cans, which are needed by families that only have one or two members.

Describe what was purchased and who it was distributed to: The two items we purchased are the ones most frequently requested by our congregate feeding programs: chocolate pudding and crushed tomatoes in large #10 cans. These items are helpful for programs that do large-scale meal production because it is costly and time-consuming to procure and open a large amount of smaller cans. The items purchased through this grant were given primarily to soup kitchens, shelters, group homes, and other residential day programs that serve full meals on a regular, if not daily, basis. We also distributed some to day programs that serve snacks (chocolate pudding) or lunch-time meals. Finally, a few pantries requested #10 cans so they could distribute them to large families that need food assistance.

Please relate a success story (any client story, anecdote, quote to show the success and impact): At a recent site visit to one of our long-time soup kitchens, the program cook expressed her excitement over being able to get #10 cans from Fulfill to prepare her meals. She stated, "It is so much easier only having to open three or four large cans, rather than spending so much time and energy opening 30!"
