#### **Holiday Grant Application**

XXVI. <u>Organization/Agency Background</u>: State your mission, vision, purpose, and provide a brief history. What are your core programs and activities? How many people do you serve? How many paid staff, full time and part-time? How many volunteers?

The mission of the Greater Berks Food Bank (GBFB) is to feed the hungry. The GBFB was founded in 1983 in response to the growing issues of poverty and hunger in our community. In our first year, we had twelve member agencies and distributed 500,000 pounds of food. In our 34th year of operation, we now supply more than 300 charitable food programs in two counties and distribute more than 7 million pounds of food. The food we distribute to our member agency programs nourishes more than 112,000 of our neighbors in need annually.

The charitable food programs we supply include traditional food assistance programs such as: food pantries, soup kitchens and shelters. We also distribute food to a multitude of direct service programs. Our Weekender Program distributes bags filled with non-perishable foods for 1,800 low-income elementary school children (at 20 school sites) to take home for the weekend. Our Produce 4 Kids program provides fresh and healthy produce items at the end of the school day to every single child at a high-poverty Reading School District elementary school. Our Mobile Market program, new in 2016, now has seven monthly distribution sites at which GBFB staff and volunteers distribute fresh and frozen, healthy, perishable foods to as many as 200 families. Finally, our Senior Food Tote Program distributes a monthly box of non-perishable foods to more than 1,600 low-income senior citizens through the federal Commodity Supplemental Food Program.

The GBFB staff includes 15 full-time employees; 2 part-time employees; and seven temporary employees (working toward permanent status). The GBFB also utilizes the help of more than 1,300 volunteers annually. In the past year, these volunteers worked more than 13,000 hours.

II. <u>Project Information</u>: Describe your food distribution program. How many people will be served by the food distribution program (children, youth, adults, seniors)? Please explain how you keep track of number of people served.

Through this grant opportunity, the GBFB is seeking funding for its Weekender Program. The Weekender Program is important because it specifically addresses the group which is perhaps most vulnerable to hunger and its ill effects: children. Today, nearly 50% of the children in Berks and Schuylkill Counties, Pennsylvania, qualify for a free or reduced lunch through the National Lunch Program -- which means that their families' income is at or below 185% of the federal poverty level. For these children, receiving the nutrition they need to stay healthy, happy, and focused in school is a daily struggle. Through the Weekender Program, the GBFB supplies a bag full of nutritionally-balanced, kid friendly, non-perishable foods to low income students each Friday, or the last day before a school holiday, at the various host school sites throughout our two county service area. Participating school sites are selected based on their percentage of children receiving free or reduced lunches. The food is distributed in nondescript bags to avoid drawing attention. The objective of the program is to provide good nutrition over the weekend to these at-risk children so they can return to school on Monday morning feeling good and ready to learn instead of sick and weak. When children are fed they are able to pay better attention in school and have a chance at a brighter future. For the 2017-18 school year, the GBFB will be adding three additional Weekender Program sites (for a total of 20 sites) which will bring the total amount of children served each week to over 1,800. The GBFB keeps track of the number of children
