I. Organization Background:

A) What are the history, mission and/or purpose of your organization? How long has the organization been providing programs and services to the community?

The Maine Children's Home for Little Wanderers has been providing social work, counseling, case management and community support for infants, youth and families for more than 118 years, having been established in 1899 in Augusta, Maine. The mission of the Maine Children's Home is "to build and strengthen families and their children, instilling hope for the future and a better quality of life."

- B) What are some of your past organizational accomplishments (last three years)?
- Summer of 2015 Celebrated the 40th Anniversary of the Sharon Abrams Teen Parent School Program, which is the only full program of its kind in the state.
- Summer of 2015 Received accreditation from the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) for The Children's Place Early Care & Education Center.
- Fall 2016 Received a \$400,000 Grant from the Harold Alfond Foundation for the Sharon Abrams Teen Parent School Program Endowment.
- Spring 2017 Second year in a row of Charity Navigator 4 Star Rating for its practices.
- C) What are your key programs and activities? Describe the communities you serve. Include populations, geographic locations served, and relevant statistics.
- The Children's Place (TCP) provides comprehensive early care and education for up to 53 infants, toddlers and preschool-age children from the general community. More than 10,086 days were provided in 2016.
- The Teen Parent School Program provides the opportunity to earn a regular high school diploma for up to 20 young parents each year. This is an alternative education setting with parenting classes, prenatal instruction, as well as a regular high school curriculum. 7 Graduates and 2 childbirths in 2016.
- The Harland A. Turner Family Counseling Center specializes in outpatient counseling to children and families. More than 400 children, youth and families are served each month.
- The Adoption Program, which places children domestically and internationally. 20 placements and 37 post placements were completed in 2016.
- The Christmas Program, which served more than 1,750 underprivileged children in 2016.
- The Summer Camp Program, which sent more than 110 underprivileged children to a weeklong overnight camp experience in 2017.

Most programs and activities are offered on our main campus in Waterville, Maine, which is a growing city of more than 16,000 people. The campus houses most of our programs and services and includes 6 buildings and 48 employees. Our primary service area is Kennebec County, which has one of the highest rates of child poverty, abuse and neglect, according to 2016 Maine KidsCount Data.

II. Project Information:

A) Statement of Need

1. Specify the community need you want to address and are seeking funds for.

There are too many children who are suffering from acute experiences of trauma. This project engages and addresses the community by informing parents, providers, educators, and the community as a whole, on the effects of early abuse and neglect, domestic violence, and other traumatic experiences and to educate that same group on how we can help those impacted by providing trauma focused treatment for anyone who has experienced abuse, neglect and other forms of trauma.

B) Project Description

1. Describe your project. How does your project meet the community need? What is unique and innovative about this project?

The TRUTH Project

Teach the effects of abuse, neglect, and all forms of traumatic experiences on children.

Reach out to Community so that parents, providers, school and community at large.

Understand the 'hard places' children have come from and realize that it is US in this together.

Trust-building for children who have not known safety or connections with others in their lives.

Hope-instill hope for the future of all children including those who have been through adversity.

We work at integrating our programs to be as effective as possible in meeting the needs of children and families. Many of these children have experienced the worst of what life at times may bring: domestic violence, many forms of abuse imaginable, and far too often, tragic situations that leave children traumatized, and adults in their lives (often, but not always, this ends up being their mom, foster, or adoptive parent) unsure how to help this child who now is living in survival mode: reacting to life from a place of fear rather than engaging in life from a place of safety.

Our project aims to:

- 1. Help children and their families or caregivers understand what adverse childhood experiences and trauma does to the developing child. Including, impacting their actual brain/body chemistry and ability to attach & connect with others;
- 2. Help parents (biological or adoptive), foster parents, and other caregivers understand that the child who has had these adverse experiences, is not willful or defiant, but is often responding from a place of fear. Fear that they may be harmed or abandoned. Fear that they or their loved ones (often mom/sisters/brothers) will be harmed in domestic violence situations or other unsafe situations;
- 3. Increase the child's sense of 'felt safety' through empowering and respecting the child, and working with the child to develop self-regulation to express what it is they need and begin building upon these strategies to grow and develop to his/her highest potential.

Here is a composite of a far too typical story:

Danni's story: Imagine, a 9-year-old girl, Danni, is living with mom and dad who struggle with substance abuse issues. Every day is a different experience or challenge, but with a similar theme. Danni wakes herself up, gets ready for school, but is late as she knows her little sister has not eaten and she takes the time to get her some cereal. She tries to wake up her parents so her sister is not left alone and unattended, as she is only 4. She misses her bus and again, tries to wake mom and dad, but cannot. She walks to school, is late, and gets a late slip and a lecture from the teacher and sent to the principal's office one more time. She is scared that she is in trouble, but she does not say anything.

She actually never says a whole lot as she fears getting her parents in trouble, or worse, getting 'taken away' from her parent, who, in spite of all her experiences, she loves very much. At lunch, she sits by herself. Other children notice she looks messy and smells unpleasant, as she wears the same clothes day after day without washing. She eats quickly before anyone can take her food from her, because this is the only regular meal she will have all day. She does not speak generally and when she does it's more like yelling. She has learned that using a loud voice is the only way people can hear her at her home. There are often loud parties with lots of people around, not paying attention to her. Sometimes she gets the kind of attention no child deserves. She and her little sister spend a lot of time in her room, so she can protect her from the strangers in the house. Danni sneaks food from the school cafeteria so she can give it to her sister, as adults aren't paying attention to caring for her or her sister.

Danni gets other responses from others in her world. The bus driver notices a little girl who can never seem to get to the bus on time, and thinks "What a lazy little girl. She can't even get up and get out to the bus on time." Teachers and the principal may believe that she is socially inept, and often 'lies' or 'steals' food or other items. They think she needs consequences for these 'bad' behaviors. Children do not want to be around her because she 'smells' and she doesn't ever smile or talk, or even seem to want to play. Danni herself believes she must not be worth much. After all, other kids won't even sit near her at lunch, let alone play with her at recess. She feels alone and afraid much of the time. One day, the school guidance counselor decided that her behavior was so isolative and odd, that maybe she should see a counselor to try to sort things out. She is referred to the Turner Counseling Center at The Maine Children's Home for individual counseling and consideration of family treatment.

Unfortunately, there are way too many stories similar to Danni's in our area.

C) Project Goal, Objectives, Activities and Expected Outcomes

GOAL: MCH will provide evidenced based treatment to children who have experienced abuse, neglect, and other traumatic experiences, as well as training and support to parents, providers, school staff and the community as a whole through the information and expertise our staff will obtain, thereby increasing public awareness of needs of children who have adverse childhood as well counseling approaches that can be taken to help these children heal from and overcome these experiences.

Objective: 6 MCH counselors will become trained and certified in evidence based treatment including TF-CBT, and 6 additional MCH staff members will be trained in TBRI as a means to provide awareness, knowledge and skills to at least 150 parents, providers, schools, and the community to provide support for children who have experienced abuse, neglect and other forms of trauma.

Activities:

- 2 staff complete all Trust Based Relational Training
- 4 2-day Trust Based Relational Trainings for parents over the course of one year
- 4 ½-day School Trainings
- 2 1-day Trust Based Relational Trainings for Community at large
- 1 1-day training for Maine Children's Home staff and Alternative School Staff.
- 2 1-day trainings for Department of Health & Human Services (Adoption/Foster Care Staff)
- Train 6 clinicians at Maine Children's Home in TFCBT to prepare each counselor to take TFCBT exam to earn TFCBT certification
- Provide outpatient counseling to 150 children utilizing an evidence-based treatment approach in one year's time.

Expected Outcomes: 6 counselors at The Turner Counseling Center will be certified in Trauma Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy and will provide this evidenced based treatment to children with traumatic life experiences and 6 Trust Based Relational Intervention trained staff from Maine Children's Home will become the resource to the community at large training at least 150 parents, providers, schools, and the larger community (potentially including foster care and adoption staff from the Department of Health and Human Services, as well as staff and clients of our local Family Violence Project) to help children who have experienced abuse, neglect, and other forms of trauma. 150 children who have experienced trauma will receive counseling during a 12-month period.

Evaluation: Using The Turner Counseling Center's data tracking system, we will track data related to 150 children who participated and completed Trauma Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy or other evidence based trauma treatment. A record of training provided to the 6 additional MCH staff members will be retained in their personnel file. Additionally, we will train at least 150 parents/school staff/providers/community members in Trust Based Relational Intervention in one year's time. A sign-in log will be used to track attendees at these trainings.

E) Target Population

Who will this grant serve? How many people will be impacted? Provide a breakdown: Number of Children, Youth, Adults, Seniors, Animals.

The grant will serve 150 children who have been abused, neglected, or experienced trauma, in the central Maine area, as well as their parents, foster parents, adoptive parents, or grandparents. School staff and other professionals and providers will be served as well.

F) Projects in the Community

How does this project relate to other existing projects in the community? Who else in the community is providing this service or has a similar project? Who are your community partners (if any)? How are you utilizing volunteers?

The TRUTH Project relates to some existing projects in the community including: Kennebec Valley Community Action Program's home visitors and safe families program, The Family Violence Project is a local agency that works with victims of Domestic Violence, Community Concepts, another local nonprofit agency, offers information to the community regarding effects of adverse childhood experiences. Though some area counseling providers offer Trauma Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy, there are <u>no</u> providers trained in Trust Based Relational Intervention in our community or state. This would be a new program Maine Children's Home would be bringing to our community and state. We also partner with The Alfond Youth Center, which houses our local Boys and Girls Club/YMCA, as well as with our local Mid Maine United Way, and several local elementary schools. Our organization utilizes volunteers for direct service (reading to children, rocking babies, etc.), for managing the logistics of our Christmas Program (inventory, packing boxes, organizing distribution), clerical support, and capital projects (renovations, painting, grounds keeping).

G) Use of Grant Funds

How will you use the grant funds?

These grant funds in addition to other funding sources and our own agency funds will be utilized to support this training project that will benefit children and families in our community. The funds will be used for staff costs, staff training, materials and supplies for the training program, and travel costs. No grant funds will be used for administrative or overhead costs.

III. Project Future

A) Sustainability

This project is directly related to the mission of our organization and will be part of future general annual budget planning. We will allocate a portion of our general fundraising to this project and will seek partnerships with the State of Maine Department of Health & Human Services and other community groups to continue this important work.

The Maine Children's Home is governed by a 17 volunteer Board Members who have been elected to serve terms up to 3 years. The Board meets officially 10 times each year and has the following committees: Executive/Nominations, Personnel/Policies, Finance/Development and Strategic Positioning and others as needs arise. The Board Members participate in a Board Orientation of programs, policies and procedures. The Board is engaged directly and indirectly in promoting The Maine Children's Home through Policy Making, Strategic Positioning and Evaluation, Public Education, Fundraising and hiring and evaluation of key leadership staff.

The key staff members responsible for this project all have advanced college degrees and a combination of more than 50 years of professional experience in nonprofit leadership, administration, counseling and community services. Debra Levenseller, LCSW, is the Clinical Director who will directly oversee the project. She has more than 25 years of social work, counseling and clinical experience. Diana Rafuse, Director of Operations, has an MBA and more than 25 years of experience in finance, administration, management and planning.
