Ozarks Food Harvest is the Feeding America food bank for southwest Missouri, serving 270 organizations across 28 Ozark counties. The Food Bank currently provides more than 18.5 million meals annually to more than 261,000 unduplicated individuals. Ozarks Food Harvest has a mission of *Transforming Hunger into Hope*.

Founded in 1983, the Food Bank acquires, processes, warehouses and distributes food and supplies to a network of food pantries, kitchens and shelters, in addition to direct-relief programs such as the Weekend Backpack Program, Mobile Food Pantry, After-School & Summer Food Programs, Senior Food Program and more.

Ozarks Food Harvest works in partnership with the community to salvage good food and distribute it to member agencies who make it available to hungry people. Ozarks Food Harvest and its volunteers inspect every donation to ensure all food is safe and ready for distribution.

The Food Bank employees 61 full time staff, as well as 3,850 volunteers annually. Last year, volunteers spent 31,189 hours sorting and repackaging donations for distribution, as well as pack weekend food backpacks and assemble senior food boxes. Without their help, an additional 15 full time employees would be needed.

II. <u>Project Information</u>: Describe your food distribution program. <u>ANSWER ALL QUESTIONS</u>. Explain the community need including demographics, geographic characteristics of the area or community to be served, community conditions and income level. What are the specific activities of the food program?

Imagine not knowing where your next meal will come from. For one in five children in southwest Missouri, the struggle with food insecurity is a daily reality. Weekends can be especially hard when school breakfasts and lunches are not available. Many of their families are underemployed, meaning they struggle to make ends meet. Wages in the Ozarks are lower than the national average and 83 percent of families we serve make less than \$20,000 a year.

Thankfully, Ozarks Food Harvest's Weekend Backpack Program provides meals – and hope – for children and their families. Each Friday, school staff distribute food bags filled with six nutritious, easy-open meals and a few weekend snacks. Meals include beef ravioli, chicken with rice and veggies, tomato soup, fruit and vegetable cups, fruit juice, cereal, crackers and shelf-stable milk.

In order to ensure uniformity and nutritional value, the Food Bank purchases these food items in bulk, instead of relying on donated goods. During the 2018-2019 school year, the average cost per food bag was \$7.86. While we will strive to keep costs as close to this as possible, we know that nutrition is of upmost importance. This makes the *Weekend Backpack Program* our most expensive program to administer, with an annual budget of \$390,000.

How do you identify/qualify those in need? How often is the food distribution offered?

Teachers and counselors help identify the children with the most critical needs, specifically targeting those who qualify for free lunch. Food bags are distributed each Friday during the school year, and students even receive extra bags if there is a school break or holiday.

How many people will be served by the food distribution program (children, youth, adults, seniors)? Please explain how you keep track of number of people served.

For the 2019-2020 school year, the program is in place at 60 schools in 16 counties in southwest Missouri, reaching 1,600 students each week. With close to 36 weeks in a school year, nearly 60,000 bags will be distributed – providing more than 346,000 meals to children. Monthly reports from each school site are required to track the number of children served.

#### 9. Approximate volume of food purchased with grant funds?

The S.L Gimbel Foundation funded a total of 3,198 units of each food item, weighing 13,083 pounds. These items were placed inside 188 food bags each week for 17 weeks of the spring school semester. Each food bag contained approximately 65.5 ounces each of Gimbel funded food, weighing 4.09 pounds. When combined with other food items, each bag weighed a total of 5.5 pounds, providing 6 weekend meals and a few snacks.

### **Key Outcomes & Results**

### 10. Describe the project's key outcomes and results based on your goals and objectives:

Ozarks Food Harvest's goal is to Transform Hunger into Hope for every food insecure individual living in the Ozarks. With the Weekend Backpack Program, at-risk children have access to the food they need during the weekend, when their free school lunch is not available.

By providing food at school, Ozarks Food Harvest can reach children directly, without having to rely on their parents or guardians. Teachers and counselors help Ozarks Food Harvest identify children with the most critical needs and those exhibiting signs or symptoms of hunger. Educators see their students on a daily basis, and are often the most knowledgeable about a student's home life. They provide bags filled with six nutritious meals for these students to take home each weekend of the school year. Students even receive extra bags if there is a school break or holiday.

In order to ensure uniformity and nutritional value, the Food Bank purchases Weekend Backpack food items in bulk, instead of relying on donated goods. This allows us to respond to school needs, and stretch each donor's dollar even further. The average cost per backpack during the 2018-19 school year was \$7.86.

With support from the S.L. Gimbel Foundation Fund, the Food Bank provided 18,558 meals to children in need via the Weekend Backpack Program. This impacted 188 children attending one of the 60 participating public schools in southwest Missouri, where the average free and reduced meal rate is 75 percent.

This program not only provided bags filled with nutritious food, it provided hope for the thousands of families who struggle to put dinner on the table. Ozarks Food Harvest is grateful to the S.L. Gimbel Foundation for their support in caring for these children and improving their futures.

# 11. Please describe any challenges/obstacles the organization encountered (if any) in attaining stated goals & Objectives.

Since 2003, the Weekend Backpack Program has been a collaboration among area schools and districts. Program administrators are in contact with the Springfield Public School's Health Services Department to coordinate existing backpack programs, avoid duplication of services and ensure high priority schools are supported.

Due to the fact that we implemented this program 16 years ago, we have faced and solved most every possible challenge. Our biggest reoccurring challenge is finding funding to care for the children that need assistance.

In order to ensure uniformity and nutritional value, the Food Bank purchases food items in bulk, instead of relying on donated goods. This makes the Program our most expensive one to administer, with an annual budget of \$390,000.

Last school year, the Weekend Backpack Program was in place at 60 schools in 16 counties in southwest Missouri. While nearly 1,700 students received food weekly, it did not reach all of the 48,510 food insecure children living in the Ozarks. Ozarks Food Harvest works hard to provide meals to every hungry child in southwest Missouri, but our biggest reoccurring challenge is funding.

One school principal reports, "We always have a waiting list for food bags, as well as other schools throughout Springfield and throughout our counties. There is always a definite need for more food and to make sure they're not hungry. Number one, we want our kids to be successful and in order to be successful they need to have full bellies and be able to focus."

#### 12. How did you overcome and/or address the challenges and obstacles?

The continuation and expansion of Ozarks Food Harvest's Weekend Backpack Program is directly related to future funding. The amount of financial support received determines the number of children who can benefit from this program and support will be prioritized to address communities with the greatest need. Ozarks Food Harvest's goal is to address this critical health need and continue to care for as many children as possible.

Since 2003, Ozarks Food Harvest's Weekend Backpack Program has provided nearly 550,000 bags filled with 3.2 million meals.

### 13. Describe any unintended positive outcomes as a result of the efforts supported by this grant.

Although no unintended outcomes were experienced, Ozarks Food Harvest was able to successfully feed 188 children over each weekend of the Spring school semester. We truly believe this additional nutrition is helping provide a positive future for these children.

Ozarks Food Harvest works closely with each Weekend Backpack Program school to support the sites, cultivating relationships and troubleshoot problems. A point-of-contact is established, usually a principal, nurse, counselor or teacher. These individuals who see the children on a daily basis are the ones who are most knowledgeable about their home situation and needs. They determine who receives the bags, ensuring the program has the greatest impact.

In order to ensure food quality and nutritional value, The Food Bank purchases these food items, instead of relying on donated goods. Easy-open meals a child can prepare on their own are chosen, as many of these children find themselves alone during the weekends when their parents are working or otherwise unavailable to prepare a meal. Each year, the menu is developed based on USDA guidelines and is refreshed based on student feedback and taste testing.

### 14. Briefly describe the impact this grant has had on your organization.

This grant from the S.L. Gimbel Foundation helped provide 18,558 meals to children in need across the Ozarks. It allowed us to feed more of the children requesting supplemental weekend food at 60 public schools in southwest Missouri, where the average free and reduced meal rate is 75 percent.

Although hunger is harmful to any individual, it is particularly devastating to children. The side effects of food insecurity can hinder a child's ability to successfully perform academically as well as socially, creating significant obstacles for proper development. Childhood food insecurity is also associated with adverse health outcomes — including diabetes and obesity — as well as increased incidences of illness and higher associated health costs.

School Counselor at Cowden said, "Our kiddos definitely appreciate the extra food to make sure they have what they need on the weekends. During the weekdays, we can pretty much keep them fed but on the weekends it's more difficult. When we have kiddos that are truly hungry, sometimes they resort to taking food that does not belong to them. They have a harder time learning, a harder time focusing, their behavior may not be as good as it would normally be if they were well fed."

Fortunately for these children, they returned to school with a free mind ready to learn, not starving and suffering from the aftermath of yet another hungry weekend. This program not only provided bags filled with nutritious food, it provided hope for the thousands of families who struggle to put dinner on the table. Ozarks Food Harvest is grateful to the S.L. Gimbel Foundation for their support in caring for these children and improving their futures.

Gimbel Foundation grant funds were used to purchase nutritious food items needed to distribute 3,198 Weekend Backpack Program food bags. Items included while and chocolate milk (\$.75 each), Multigrain O's (\$.24 each), beef ravioli (\$.50 each), chicken with rice and veggies (\$.57), tomato soup (\$.65 each), fruit cups (4 items at \$.32 each), corn (\$.35 each) and green beans (\$.35 each). Funding of \$15,000.00 allowed Ozarks Food Harvest to purchase 3,198 units of each item. These items, valued at \$4.69, were placed in 188 backpacks, each week for the entire 17 weeks of the spring 2019 semester.

They were combined with additional food items in order to provide each child with six nutritious meals and a few weekend snacks each Friday of the school year. By purchasing these items, the Food Bank was able to ensure uniformity and nutritional value.

Funding from the Gimbel Foundation allowed Ozarks Food Harvest to continue this program and helped provide children with the healthy food they need over the weekends. These funds impacted 188 children each week for 17 weeks who attend one of 60 public schools in southwest Missouri.

Madilyn told us, "I noticed a difference once I started receiving the backpack because there was more food over the weekend and I wasn't hungry because I eat a lot. When I eat, it gives me more energy and helps me focus better. I wanna say thank you to the people who donate to the backpack program because it helps a lot of kids in need that are hungry. When I'm hungry, I feel horrible and it makes me really mean and cranky. On Friday when I get to take the food home, it makes me feel really good because then I know we have more food and won't get hungry."

Presley, age 9 told us, "I don't have enough food to eat over the weekends. We don't have enough money to buy cereal and stuff to have for breakfast. The food bag helps me because I want to get A's on everything. I want to be a veterinarian when I grow up."

## Weekend Backpack Program

### **Project Budget**

In order to ensure uniformity and nutritional value, the Food Bank purchases Weekend Backpack food items in bulk, instead of relying on donated goods. This allows us to expand our program, provide more meals to these children, and stretch each donor's dollar even further. The average cost per backpack during the 2018-19 school year was \$7.86.

A gift of \$15,000 will allow Ozarks Food Harvest to provide a total of 3,253 food bags – containing a total of 19,518 meals – to students attending Springfield Public School during the 2019-2020 school year.
