

2016 S.L. Gimbel Foundation Fund Narrative

I. Organization Background:

A. Mission, History, Purpose: Planned Parenthood of Central and Greater Northern New Jersey, Inc. (PPCGNNJ) provides high-quality, comprehensive, accessible, and affordable reproductive and complementary health care services, emphasizing privacy, confidentiality, dignity and sexual self-determination. We advocate for public policies that guarantee these rights and ensure access to such services. We provide and support education programs that expand understanding of human sexuality.

Through our medical services, education and counseling we focus on the health and well-being of individuals. Our goal is to protect, promote, and maintain health and to prevent disease. We do so by integrating our medical service delivery with community education in order to improve health, safety, and equity outcomes; and provide our clinicians and education staff with skills and strategies to change the social circumstances that shape the health of our patients.

Founded in 1932, PPCGNNJ plays a vital role in providing quality, affordable health care and sexual health education to vulnerable populations, including low-income and uninsured women, men, and young people.

B. Accomplishments:

- Implemented a new Practice Management Software and EHR;
- Implemented a 24-hour Call Center at all Health Centers;
- Implemented Mothers at Heart program for pregnant and/or parenting teen moms;
- Implemented Teen Health Project in 5 sites in Monmouth and Union Counties;
- Hosted the Teen Conference statewide conference for High School Students attended by more than 400 students from 21 schools;
- Received approval through the New Jersey State Nurses Association to be able to award Nursing Contact Hours for professional training;

C. Programs and Activities: PPCGNNJ's primary program areas are Medical, Education, and Advocacy. Our Medical services include but are not limited to: comprehensive gynecological exams, immunizations, breast and cervical cancer screening, screening and treatment for sexually transmitted infections (STIs), testing and counseling for HIV, testicular and prostate cancer screening, pregnancy testing and options counseling, and screening for other health indicators.

Our Education department provides an array of outreach and education programs that impart medically accurate, age-appropriate education programs aimed at health promotion and alerting residents to the availability of reproductive health services.

The advocacy arm works to ensure unimpeded access to reproductive health care, comprehensive sexuality education, and other related issues.

PPCGNNJ covers an 11 county area that predominantly spans the central and northern regions of the state. This area is home to 57% of New Jersey's total population of 8.9 million residents.

The 11 counties served by PPCGNNJ are Bergen, Hunterdon, Mercer, Middlesex, Monmouth, Morris, Ocean, Somerset, Sussex, Union, and Warren.

New Jersey is home to one of the most dynamic and diverse populations in the country with scores of different cultures residing within a densely populated area. It ranks among the wealthiest states in the nation, however, lesser known—pockets of extreme poverty exist throughout the state within distinct, geographically delineated areas. Several of these disadvantaged, disenfranchised pockets are home to low-income, predominantly minority residents that have the highest cumulative number of HIV/AIDS cases state-wide, highest rates of sexually transmitted infections and teen birth rates, presenting a significant challenge to providers aiming to address these needs. Six of our 16 health centers including Trenton are located in Medically Underserved Areas (MUA).

II. Project Information:

A) Statement of Need: On April 1, 2015, PPCGNNJ merged with Planned Parenthood Association of the Mercer Area. While the merger will position the organization to more effectively provide high quality reproductive healthcare to the residents of New Jersey, it also resulted in gaps in services specifically within the education department. At this time, we do not have a dedicated educator in Mercer County to provide education and link residents to health services.

The population of the greater Trenton area is predominantly low-income. The women, men and young people who we seek to engage through this project are essentially uninsured, many are minimally educated and 82% are people of color.

There are many barriers to reproductive health care faced by women and men of color in Trenton, a city with more than a quarter of its population living in poverty. For Latinos, who represent more than a third of Trenton's population, these obstacles include economic challenges, language issues, cultural differences, fear related to immigration status, lack of familiarity with the health care and social service systems, religious issues, and reluctance to seek help outside the family. In the African American community, which comprises 52% of Trenton's population and experiences some of the same barriers as Latinos, a history of discrimination and inferior quality of services and education have created an environment in which low-income African American women, through no fault of their own, face significantly higher barriers to health care, particularly reproductive health care, than do non-Hispanic white women. These barriers in both communities translate into limited utilization of health care, resulting in poor health outcomes.

According to a local study, *The Status of Women and Girls in Mercer County and Available Community Resources* by Sandy Gibson, Ph.D. of The College of New Jersey, preventive health care, including Pap smears and breast cancer screenings, are urgent priorities for the women and girls who reside in Trenton. Of utmost significance, the study finds that one of the leading causes of the high dropout rate among girls in Trenton is teen pregnancy, which is 8.5 times the state average. Moreover, the study reports that sexually transmitted infections are a major public health issue in Mercer County and that the prevalence of HIV/AIDS among African American women in Trenton is alarming, with an estimate that 1 in 63 females has HIV/AIDS.

B) Project Goal, Objectives and Methodology: The overarching goal of Responsible Choices is to reduce unintended pregnancy and prevent the spread of STIs, including HIV/AIDS.

Responsible Choices:

- Provides participants with the tools to make informed decisions and build healthy relationships;
- Stresses the value of abstinence while also preparing young people for when they become sexually active;
- Provides medically accurate information about the health benefits and side effects of all contraceptives, including condoms, as a means to prevent pregnancy and reduce the risk of contracting STIs, including HIV/AIDS;
- Encourages family communication about sexuality between parent and child;
- Teaches the skills necessary to make responsible decisions about sexuality, including how to avoid unwanted verbal, physical, and sexual advances; and
- Teaches how alcohol and drug use can effect responsible decision making.

The program includes multi-session programs that take place over a period of time with the same participants, intensive single-session programs, and outreach strategies. Responsible Choices meets the need of the community by offering teens and adults the tools they need to protect themselves from negative sexual health outcomes. The program uses a non-traditional, culturally competent approach that includes the unique perspectives of people of color. By using this approach, we have been able to improve the quality of outreach and ongoing communication with these underserved populations.

Objectives:

- Objective I: Participants will demonstrate a minimum of a 75% increase in knowledge acquisition of sexually transmitted infections and ways to prevent infections.
- Activities: Group and/or individual sessions delivered at various locations throughout the community.
- Objective II: A minimum of 75% of participants will report that as a result of the information they learned during our safer sex workshop, they will make healthier choices regarding sexual activity.
- Activities: Group and/or individual sessions delivered at various locations throughout the community.
- Objective III: A minimum of 75% of participants will report that they are more aware of the health services available to them in their community.
- Activities: Outreach events, resources provided during educational workshops, linkages to health care.

Timeline: Responsible Choices is on-going throughout the year, therefore all education related activities run on an annual basis.

Who will Benefit: While this project is intended to serve the entire community, emphasis will be on those living in Trenton that have the highest risk factors for unintended pregnancies, STIs, and HIV/AIDS. The project seeks to serve a minimum of 3,000 individuals. We estimate that it will reach approximately 1,800 youth and 1,200 adults.

Comprehensive sexuality education programs in Trenton are sorely lacking. HiTops, one of Mercer County's longest standing provider of sexual health information is no longer offering these services in Trenton leaving an even wider gap in service provision.

PPCGNNJ partners with numerous community-based organizations that include but are not limited to public and private schools, youth-serving agencies, faith-based organizations, colleges, and other social service providers.

PPCGNNJ uses volunteers in most areas of our organization. Volunteers assist staff with health center, human resources, development, education, and advocacy activities.

C) Project Outcomes and Evaluation: The key outcome and impact of the project is the reduction in the incidence of unplanned pregnancy and the spread of STI's including HIV/AIDS.

We evaluate the impact of our education programs via pre-and post-testing. The tests are designed to gauge existing and increased knowledge gains, behavioral intent, and self-awareness to determine if the information presented will have a positive effect on the choices our participants make regarding their health. In order to measure our quantitative goals, we track the number of: education sessions delivered, program participants, and demographic data.

- **D)** How will you use the grant funds? Funds from the S.L. Gimbel Foundation will be used to hire a full time sexual health educator.
- III. **Project Future:** We are continuously seeking funding for our programs and services. As a newly merged affiliate, we are still learning and researching funding opportunities in this area.

IV. Governance, Executive Leadership and Key Personnel/Staff Qualifications

A) PPCGNNJ's board of directors is a group of knowledgeable, and culturally diverse members who collectively possess special areas of knowledge. The board members understand business models, fund development and health care reform in order to effectively guide the organization. The board is responsible for the tenure and responsibilities of the CEO, and the overall fiscal health of the organization. Board committees include: Executive, Governance, Budget and Finance, and Nominating. There are also several ad-hoc committees. The board makes decisions by a majority vote when a quorum exists.

B) Qualifications of key personnel:

Alison Glaser, VP of Community Services will oversee the project. Ms. Glaser has over 15 years of experience in the social service field. She has worked at the local, state, and national levels developing youth mentoring programs and school-business partnerships. Prior to her work with Planned Parenthood, Ms. Glaser worked at the national office of Big Brothers Big Sisters of America and was the Director of the Connecticut Mentoring Partnership. Ms. Glaser serves as an adjunct professor of Social Work at Rutgers University and Brookdale Community College. She earned a Master of Social Work degree in Administration and Social Planning from Temple University and a B.A. in Sociology from the Pennsylvania State University.

Personnel: The sexual health educator will deliver group and/or individual educational sessions, conduct outreach activities and participate in community events.

The VP of Community Services will be responsible for project oversight including meeting with community partners.

Fringe Benefits: Benefits are calculated at 25% of salaries. They include all state and federal taxes, insurance, retirement, etc.

Local Travel: Mileage for educator to travel to community locations to conduct sessions, outreach and community events. Travel allotment for VP of Community Services to provide oversight and meet with community partners.

Supplies: Project supplies include folders, pens, paper, flip charts, markers. Educational materials include pamphlets on safer sex, STI's, Contraception, HIV, etc. Average cost of pamphlets is \$150/500 for English and Spanish.

Printing/Copying: Reproduction of lessons, flyers to promote program, etc.

Condoms: Condoms are distributed free of charge to program participants and during outreach/community events, as appropriate.

Cell Phone: Cell Phone for educator to use as a means of communication especially while out in the field.

Laptop: Laptop for educator to complete required activities, research, etc.

Professional Development: Seminars relating to sexual health and/or related topics to assist educator maintain abreast of cutting edge strategies and information.

Occupancy: Sexual health educator will have office space at the Trenton health center and at nearby Hamilton, and the College of New Jersey.

1. Use of Grant Funds

Grant funds must be expended within the grant period, for the purpose and objectives described in your grant proposal. Grant funds may not be expended for any other purpose without prior written approval by The Community Foundation. If there are significant difficulties in making use of the funds as specified in your proposal, or if the grant funds cannot be spent within the grant period, notify us in writing promptly.

Formal requests for extensions or variances must be submitted to the Foundation's Board of Directors for approval a minimum of 60 days before the end of the grant period.

Requests for variances or extensions are reviewed on a case-by-case basis and approved by the Board of Directors. If a request is denied, unused funds must be immediately refunded to the Foundation.

2. Payment of Grant Funds

The grant funds will be paid in full by the Foundation upon receipt of the signed Grant Agreement. Challenge grant funds will be paid in full upon receipt of the signed Grant Agreement and upon receipt of documentation providing evidence that condition(s) of the challenge grant has/have been met.

3. Certification and Maintenance of Exempt Organization Status

This grant is specifically conditioned upon Grantee's status as an eligible grantee of The Community Foundation. The Foundation has obtained a copy of the Grantee's IRS determination letter. Grantee confirms that it has not had any change in its tax-exempt status, and shall notify the Foundation immediately of any such change.

4. Final Report and Records

The Grantee will submit the Grant Evaluation report per the deadline set forth in the award letter. This report includes a narrative on outcomes based on goals and objectives set forth in the grant proposal and an expenditure report documenting use of grant funds. If equipment was purchased, copies of receipts need to be included.

5. Grantee's Financial Responsibilities

Grantee will keep records of receipts and expenditures of grant funds and other supporting documentation related to the grant at least four (4) years after completion of the grant and will make such records of receipts, expenditures and supporting documentation available to the Foundation upon request.

6. Publicity

8. Termination

The Community Foundation may terminate this agreement, withhold payments, or both at any time, if, in the Community Foundation's judgment: a) The Community Foundation is not satisfied with the quality of the Grantee's progress toward achieving the project goals and objectives; b) the Grantee dissolves or fails to operate; c) the Grantee fails to comply with the terms and conditions of this agreement.

9. Limitation of Support

This Agreement contains the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the Grant and supersedes any previous oral or written understandings or agreements.
