I. Organization Background; Target Population:

Planned Parenthood of Metropolitan Washington (PPMW) is the Planned Parenthood affiliate that serves the DC metro area, including the District of Columbia, Prince George's and Montgomery Counties in Maryland and 16 counties in northern Virginia. For nearly 80 years PPMW has served women, teens and men seeking high quality, affordable, accessible, non-judgmental reproductive health services including pregnancy testing, contraceptive counseling and services, emergency contraception and abortion, as well as screenings for sexually transmitted infections, cervical and breast cancer. For over 30 years our Education Department has offered programs throughout our service area-- often partnering with schools, community organizations, health care professionals and even some churches to assist young people, their parents and advisers in making informed choices around sexual activity.

II. Project Information:

Located adjacent to Washington, DC, Prince George's County, Maryland is the state's most diverse county with minority groups (i.e, Latinos, African-Americans and people of African descent) accounting for approximately 80% of the population. Census data from 2014 reflects a slight increase in the population of Blacks and Hispanics with Latinos representing 17% of the population and Blacks 65%. Prince George's has the second highest STI rate in the state and a higher rate of teen pregnancy than the rest of the state. Because of these circumstances, PPMW opened a new health center in November in District Heights, Prince George's County, a health enterprise zone.

Prince George's County Health Department's 2015 Health Report identifies three important factors that have persuaded PPMW that it is imperative that our affiliate also expands our health education activities into the County:

- Teen pregnancy rates for Latina women in the county are more than double those of Black and white teens.
- The HIV prevalence rate has increased 135% from 2002-2012. Eighty six percent of the increase is in Black communities with 1/3 of new cases in people aged 20-29.
- Sexually transmitted infection rates also are increasing at an alarming rate in Prince George's County. The incidence of STIs is the second highest among the 24 counties in the state, affecting mainly 15-24 year olds.

Because of these factors, PPMW will implement three education initiatives in Prince George's County to help reverse these disturbing trends.

- 1. The first initiative will tackle HIV prevalence and Sexually Transmitted Infection (STI) rates. Through the training and implementation of Sisters, Informing, Healing, Learning, Empowering (SIHLE), an evidence based, CDC-recognized intervention, we will reach middle and high school aged girls who identify as African American or Latina. During six, one-hour sessions, SIHLE empowers young women to change their behavior in order to reduce sexually transmitted infections and unintended pregnancies. SIHLE is a small group, skills training intervention to reduce risky sexual behaviors among adolescent females through interactive discussions in groups of 10–12 that are led by young women. The intervention emphasizes ethnic and gender pride, and enhances awareness of HIV risk reduction strategies such as abstaining from sex, using condoms consistently, and having fewer sex partners.
- 2. PPMW also will expand the Juntas/Together program into Prince George's County. Parents and teens often lack the tools to talk about sexual or reproductive health, but that they want these conversations to happen. PPMW's Juntas/Together is designed to meet that need by convening mothers or mother figures to build intergenerational communication skills that encourage healthy relationships, reduction of teen pregnancy and STI rates. The program will specifically target the Latina population. In the first session, mothers/mother figures

participate in a "brush up" workshop on sexual reproductive health to ensure that their knowledge base is consistent with their daughters'. In the second session, the mothers/daughters come together for robust discussion and learning

3. Finally, PPMW will implement our already successful sexual and reproductive health workshops that focus on seven core areas: STIs, Birth Control Methods, Anatomy, Consent, Healthy Relationships, Puberty/Hygiene and Teen Health Advocacy. These activities will be carried out in partnership with schools, youth-serving non-profits, and churches/religious organizations. PPMW educators annually provide more than 15,000 area youth and their families with critical reproductive health education emphasizing the prevention of teen pregnancy and STIs including HIV/AIDS. With this grant, PPMW will expand this work into Prince George's County.

PPMW is uniquely qualified to offer these programs. Our affiliate has successfully implemented the SIHLE curriculum since 2009 and our two well-known, sought after master facilitators on staff have taken nearly 300 women through SIHLE curriculum cycles with full fidelity. We recruit participants in multiple ways using various mediums such as social media and face-to-face conversations. For our school-based groups we table during lunch, present at back to school nights and visit individual classrooms in order to recruit participants. Many times staff and past participants make referrals to the program. We also use eye catching flyers with links to our website to do the job of recruitment when we are not there. We also rely on street canvassing, incentives and visibility events to peak interest in programming. These are all variables that will depend on the location and culture of the population we intend to serve.

Program Objectives and Activities

Objective I: To strengthen current relationships and build new partnerships with schools, youth-serving nonprofits, and churches/religious organizations, providing sexual and reproductive health education to 1,000 people in Prince George's County, with 50% of those identified as at-risk, by June 2017. **Activities:**

- Establish relationships with school administrators and schedule reproductive and sexual health education sessions.
- Conduct focus groups among high school age students to assess their knowledge of and attitudes toward LARC methods, STI and HIV prevention and their perceived barriers.

Objective II: To deliver "SIHLE/AMIGAS", a CDC evidence-based intervention to 100 African-American and Latina at-risk youth, with full fidelity, between September 2016 and June 2017. To increase knowledge by 30%, as evaluated by pre- and post-tests, for 80% of SIHLE participants by the end of the grant period. **Activities:**

• 100 girls (ages 14-18, Latina and African American/Black) will participate in SIHLE, our six-week reproductive and holistic health training program, between September 2016- March 2017.

Objective III: To expand "Juntas/Together", a culturally competent innovative program for graduates of SIHLE/AMIGAS, to 50 young women and their mothers/maternal figures in the Latina and African-American communities by the end of the 2016 academic year. To increase comfort levels to discuss reproductive health and sex with their family members in 75% of participants in Juntas/Together by the end of the grant period. **Activities:**

- 50 teen girls (ages 14-16, Latina and African American/Black) and their mother-figures will participate in a reproductive health education and relationship building program
- workshops will be implemented three times between March and June (to be completed by Summer 2017)

Community Partners

When the PPMW Prince George's Health Center opened in November, 2015 we did a profile of Suitland, Prince George's, Maryland and reached out to the following organizations that are either working in reproductive health, or seeking reproductive health services. These new or existing partners include:

- <u>BARC</u>- is a multidimensional service organization that directly serves the youth of Prince George's County. We have been partnering with BARC and Bladensburg HS to provide reproductive health education presentations for the students in their teen parenting class. BARC will serve as a great partner by offering our education programs to the locations they serve.
- <u>Bladensburg High School-</u> BHS has a population of over 2000 students, 49% African-American and 49% Hispanic/Latino. Its population is a direct reflection of the counties changing population. We began our partnership with "Blade" in the fall of 2015 and have dates booked through spring 2016 for general education programming.
- Northwestern High School NHS is the second largest school in the state of Maryland. Serving over 2600 students during day and evening schools. We began our partnership with NHS in the fall of 2015 working with its Teen Parenting classes and hope to expand our services to this community.
- The Foundation School is an alternative education campus that serves some of the most at-risk youth in PG County. We initially started with a one off presentation, but after a great session we built a rapport with the students and have been asked to come back throughout the rest of the school year. Foundation school has requested that PPMW offer SIHLE to their female student body.
- Hunter Memorial A.M.E. Church is a faith-based community staple in the Suitland area. Serving countless
 members and the local community through compassionate and real outreach. We have partnered with Hunter
 AME for World AIDS Day 2015, where Gabbi was the featured speaker for the day. We have future
 programs in the works with Hunter AME's youth and young adult groups, as well as it Kingdom Women's
 Ministry.

Project Outcomes and Evaluation

Short-term:

- Increase presence in the community, expanding our current partnerships by 150%,
- Develop an outreach and education strategy based on the information gained from focus group participants;
- Recruit 150 black and Latina girls into SIFILE; Retain 100 girls over the course of the grant period.
- Recruit 50 SIHLE/AMIGAS graduates and their mothers or maternal figures to participate in Juntas/Together

Long-term:

- Educate at least 1,000 people in Prince George's County including middle and high school students, young adults, parents and parental figures, and other members of the community on comprehensive reproductive and sexual health education. 50% will be considered at-risk based on the findings of the county health report.
- Through enhanced partnerships PPMW will educate and empower Prince George's youth populations.
- Increase level of knowledge by 30%, as evaluated by pre and post-tests, for 80% of SIHLE participants.
- Increase comfort levels to discuss reproductive health and sex with family members in seventy-five percent of participants in Juntas/Together, as established by quantitative evaluations.

Overall impact: Reduce teen pregnancy, STI, and HIV rates in at-risk Black and Latino youth in Prince George's County by providing evidence based and culturally competent health education programing, as well as building community relationships to link education to reproductive health care services.

We will monitor progress of our quantitative objectives quarterly throughout the grant period.

Education staff will track attendance and retention to measure program outputs using pre- and post-tests. The tests will include factual, knowledge-based, sexual and reproductive health questions as well as questions evaluating attitudes and behavior change. Surveys and participant feedback will be used to measure participant observations within their mother-daughter relationships and perceptions of more successful conversations around reproductive health and decisions. Our goal is for 80% of participants to demonstrate a minimum 30% increase in knowledge about sexuality and reproductive health. Seventy-five percent will have increased comfort levels to discuss reproductive health and sex with their family member.

Project Future

PPMW has offered culturally and linguistically competent minority youth-focused programming for more than 30 years, currently funded by organizations such as the Lazar Foundation, the Munson Foundation, the Herb Block Foundation, the DC Government Office of the State Superintendent of Education (OSSE), the Community Foundation for the National Capital Region (CFNCR) One City Fund and the CFNCR for Montgomery County Sharing Montgomery Fund, among others. We will continue our aggressive outreach for government and foundation grants to expand education programming in Prince George's County. As long as DC area minority and low-income communities are disproportionately threatened by an ongoing HIV/AIDS epidemic and alarmingly high rates of teen pregnancy and sexually-transmitted-infections transmission, PPMW will continue to serve these families.

PPMW needs an initial investment to break into the community. This investment will allow us to build relationships with community leaders, local schools, community organizations, and non-profits with similar missions. This initial investment is integral to becoming a leader in health education in Prince George's County, as we are in Washington, DC and Montgomery County, MD. This will position us to meet the demand that the community has demonstrated. Once we have established our evidence based curricula in the community, coupled with the outpouring of demand from schools and other community agencies, we anticipate ramping up our funding in Prince George's County, rounding out our educational presence in the DMV.

IV. Governance, Executive Leadership and Key Personnel/Staff Qualifications

The Board of Directors at PPMW oversees the management and operations of the affiliate, including hiring and evaluating the CEO, approving annual budgets and regularly evaluating the fiscal performance of the organization. The Board also establishes a bold vision for PPMW, setting the strategic direction for the affiliate while also ensuring it has the financial and human resources necessary to carry out its mission. Board Committees include Finance, Governance/Nominating, Development and Audit. As organizational issues arise from that could benefit from Board attention, task forces/work groups are appointed by the Board Chair. Board decisions are made via recommendations from Board Committees or through full Board deliberations and votes.

Project Personnel

Tucker O'Donnell, MPH, CPH is Director of Education. She develops, manages, directs and evaluates PPMW's sexuality health education and professional training programs that are medically accurate, age appropriate and culturally competent and are targeted to both youth and adults.

Gabrielle Martinez, Assistant Manager of Education and SIHLE Program Manager, creates innovative and flexible models of learning and coordinates a multifaceted pregnancy prevention and reproductive health program for female and male adolescents, adults and professionals.

Lena Thompson, Community Health Educator and Assistant SIHLE Program Manager, assists in the development and execution of community outreach and sexual and reproductive health education programs at PPMW.

Karen Gomez is PPMW's Bilingual Health Educator and AMIGAS Program Manager. She develops and implements community outreach and sexual and reproductive health education programs and creates innovative and flexible learning models.



Dear Taxpayer:

This is in response to your request of May 29, 2008, regarding your tax-exempt status.

Our records indicate that a determination letter was issued in November 1945, that recognized you as exempt from Federal income tax, and discloses that you are currently exempt under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.
