

I. Organization Background and Target Population

Planned Parenthood of the St. Louis Region and Southwest Missouri (PPSLR) has been providing sexuality education, resources, and health services to the St. Louis community since its inception in 1932. Our mission is to provide, protect, and support reproductive rights and services. PPSLR is the safety net health services provider for more than 40,000 women, men, teens, and families, including many low-income, uninsured and underinsured. We provide reproductive services to residents of Missouri and Illinois from 8 health centers: 6 in the metro St. Louis region and 2 in Southwest Missouri. PPSLR offers accurate, age-appropriate sexuality education programs to youth, parents and professionals working with youth. Our teen sexuality programs are award-winning. One program received nationally competitive grant funding last year to support the expansion of teen advocacy efforts around sexuality education. Programs available to organizations and schools include the following:

- Peer Education: This program provides comprehensive sexuality education to teens during 36 hours of
 interactive learning to give youth information and skills to delay the onset of sexuality activity,
 communicate respectfully with parents and peers, and behave safely and responsibly when they
 choose to become sexually active.
- 2. Teen Advocates for Sexual Health (TASH): TASH empowers a diverse group of high schools students to advocate for comprehensive, medically accurate sex education and the prevention of teen dating violence on behalf of teens in the St. Louis area.
- 3. Real Life Real Talk®: "Sex Ed for Parents," adult guardians, and other caregivers of teens focuses on building open communication, and on raising parents' awareness of how technology, media and social media are impacting their teens with sexually explicit content.
- 4. Topics for tailored education sessions: Our sex educators offer education sessions on a wide range of single-subject sexual and reproductive health topics that can be adapted to accommodate time limitations with age-appropriate content for middle to high school students and parents and educators.

Missouri's public education system teaches abstinence exclusively and at the expense of teen's health. Teens in our community are experiencing dating violence, pregnancy, sexually transmitted infections (STIs), and new and enhanced forms of bullying. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), nationwide 8 in 10 teens do not receive sex education before they first have sex. And while 70 percent of youth report speaking to their parents about birth control and sex, many parents are not prepared to give their children comprehensive information. Although these are nationwide phenomena, dense concentrations of poverty and lack of access to information and services increase the risk factors for many in the St. Louis area. Poverty is pervasive in St. Louis City and in pockets of St. Louis County. According to 2010-2015 data from the Missouri Census Data Center related to persons under 18, 42 percent of individuals in the City and almost 16 percent of individuals in the County live in poverty. In St. Louis City, almost a quarter of all households receive food stamp benefits; 10 percent of county households received these benefits in the last year.

While pregnancy in St. Louis has declined, it still continues to see a higher than average rate than national trends. According to 2010-2014 data published by the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services, 7.4 percent of all births in the St. Louis region were to pre-teens and teenage mothers aged 10 to 19 years old. The rate of teen pregnancy in the City of St. Louis is statistically significantly higher than that of St. Louis County and the state of Missouri. Becoming a teen parent significantly reduces the likelihood for both girls and boys of earning a high school diploma. For more than a decade the City of St. Louis has ranked in the top five for STIs. In the 2014 report from the CDC, St. Louis had more cases of chlamydia and gonorrhea per capita than any other independent city or county in the U.S. These rates have declined somewhat over the past several years. There were 14,711 chlamydia infections diagnosed in the St. Louis

area last year, down from a high of 15,517 in 2011. Gonorrhea infections totaled 4,346 in the area, compared to 5,014 in 2011. However, syphilis has steadily increased, from 92 infections in 2011 to 153 last year. Almost a third of all new STD cases in the St. Louis region are in those under 25 years of age, with females from 15 to 19 having some of the highest rates of new STD cases.

II. <u>Project Information</u>

Our Education and Training Department is a valued partner to 78 elementary, middle, and high schools; disability services; and other community-based organizations that depend on us to provide the youth they serve with accurate information and tools and skills youth need to protect their bodies and respect one another. Last year we provided sexuality education programs at no cost to 8,000 youth, parents and health professionals working with youth in the St. Louis area. We are passionate about serving low-income and at-risk youth and work with many community partners that serve these target populations.

Last year, PPSLR purchased and began using "Making Proud Choices!" — an evidence-based teen prevention pregnancy program evaluated and recommended by the Office of Adolescent Health at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Evaluation of the program shows that it effectively increases consistent use of contraceptives within all youth populations, especially African Americans; however, our educator has noted some issues. The curriculum does not provide much information on puberty and anatomy, topics that youth in our community need; it also lacks information on sexual identify and orientation, and youth have not found it to be culturally appropriate. As a result, our educator reviewed potential curricula that could fill the informational gaps.

PPSLR's Education and Training Department currently has one full time sex educator providing sexuality programs throughout the St. Louis and western Illinois areas supplemented by some part time hours. Although our reach has been widespread, we are restrained in further developing relationships with other organizations as we do not wish to offer any programming that we knowingly do not have the capacity to fulfill. Having another full time sex educator on staff would greatly help our affiliate be able to conduct effective youth and parent outreach and education around teen sexual health issues, sexual and dating violence, and sexual identity and orientation.

PPSLR identified the Family Life and Sexual Health (FLASH) Curriculum as the best fit for the St. Louis region. FLASH is a science-based comprehensive sexual health education curriculum developed by Public Health Seattle – King County and designed to prevent teen pregnancy, STIs, and sexual violence. FLASH is available for elementary, middle, high school, and special education populations. It adheres to the Characteristics of Effective Sex Education Programs and aligns with both the CDC's National Health Education Standards for Sexual Health and the National Sexuality Education Standards. Based on the Theory of Planned Behavior, the curriculum includes a strong family-involvement component and supports diverse community values through its design and homework, encouraging discussion about values to help increase protective factors supporting abstinence, the use of birth control and condoms, and respecting others' sexual health decisions. PPSLR would like to purchase 2 binders of this curriculum which contains lesson plans for all school levels as well as a 1-year digital license access to the high school lesson plans. Each sex educator on staff would then have access to hardcopy lesson materials. Digital access would allow the affiliate to view any immediate revisions or additions to the curriculum in real time.

Obtaining FLASH and another experienced full time staff member for Education and Training assist in reaching our goal to expand capacity to deliver high-quality comprehensive age-appropriate sexuality education to youth in the St. Louis area. To achieve this, we plan to engage in the following objectives and activities below:

Objective 1: Integrate a science-based sexuality curriculum with the existing evidence-based curriculum to provide youth more information on anatomy, sexual orientation, gender identity, and healthy relationships with the first classes taught in fall 2016.

Activities: Purchase the FLASH Curriculum; conduct internal staff training to achieve internal consistency in teaching by 8/30/16; begin using curriculum by 9/1/16.

Objective 2: Hire an additional experienced full time sexual education specialist to increase the number of sexuality education programs delivered to youth, young adults, and parents in the service area.

Activities: Post the job description to the PPSLR website and other job boards, recruit and interview candidates; hire a sexuality education specialist; train them in current sexuality education programs.

The objectives and activities described above will be primarily completed between June 1, 2016 and May 31, 2017. The job description for the sexuality education supervisor is currently being written with the intent to hire someone by the end of April or May 2016. The FLASH curricula will be purchased in June 2016; the new supervisor will have the opportunity to become oriented to the affiliate as well as work with the current sex educator to review the curricula and collaborate to create internal teaching consistency between late June and August of 2016 when school generally resumes.

Many of our education programs are evaluated. Evaluations include a pre- and post-test to measure knowledge gained by participants; PPSLR also measures the likelihood that participants will talk with their peers, their parents or other relatives about what they learned. It is important to us that our programs empower youth and parents to take control of their sexual health, know when and how to access health services, and recognize Planned Parenthood as their partner in a healthy future. Our anticipated outcomes are the following:

- PPSLR will have additional staff to conduct sexuality education in the community.
- PPSLR will have relationships with at least 85 schools and community-based organizations in the St. Louis region in comparison with 78 the prior year.
- PPSLR will have educated at least 10,000 students, youth, parents, and health professionals on youth sexual health and violence issues in comparison with 8,000 youth the prior year.

III. Project Future

We are reviewing our current services to determine a strategic plan moving forward that will address the needs of our patients and community, identify and resolve challenges to service provision, and allow for expansion, to offer new care options for women, teens, and families. This discussion includes the shifting of staff responsibilities as well as the addition of new staff where necessary. PPSLR is committed to seeking out further funding to sustain the salary of a sexual educator as well as determine what funding within its own budget can be used for this purpose. Our dream is to continue providing community education and incorporate professional education into our program offerings.

IV. Governance, Executive Leadership, and Key Personnel

The Board of Directors of PPSLR is composed of 35 members, 6 of whom serve on the Executive Committee. The full board meets nine times annually. Six other working committees exists, with Board and senior staff members, in addition to the Executive Committee: Development; Business Initiatives; Finance and Audit; Leadership and Governance; Legislative and Political; and Compliance, Quality Assurance, Risk Management, and Clinical QA. Within PPSLR, the President/CEO is appointed by the Board and acts as the Chief Executive Officer of the Corporation and affiliated corporations. Implementation of policies, operational management, direction of programs and activities, and the appointment of staff is under the President/CEO. The Board provides governance, leadership, and direction to the affiliate.

The educators we have on staff include manager Carolyn Spencer and full time educator Elyse Vesser. Carolyn has been a part of reproductive health care services for over 30 years; she ensures that all affiliate staff receive appropriate training and coordinates ongoing training and professional development. Elyse has been a sex educator both at PPSLR and other reproductive health and justice organizations. In addition, trained clinical staff may assist with educational programs when able and necessary.

Salaries and Fringe

This includes salary for a full-time Sexuality Education Supervisor. This person would be paid bi-weekly at \$17.00/hour, 40 hours/week for 52 weeks. Fringe is calculated at 20% of salary.

Curriculum

One complete binder includes lesson plans for elementary, middle, and high school and for special education programs and is priced at \$374.99. Purchasing 2 binders would provide each sex educator on staff a binder with hardcopies of lesson plans. Public Health Seattle-King County has made minor revisions to this science-based promising curriculum which they provide in real time to those who have a digital license subscription. A 1 year digital license provides access to high school lesson plans online with access to any revisions immediately instead of having to consistently check back for updates.


