

1.Organization/Agency Background A. History, Mission and Purpose:

Rapha House is dedicated to “Love, Rescue, and Heal” girls who have been sold into brothels, trafficked or severely exploited in Cambodia, Thailand, Myanmar, and Haiti. We started in Cambodia is 2004. Today we serve over 1000 girls, some boys , their families and communities.

B. Organization Accomplishments:

1. Rapha House owns and operates Safe Houses, Kids Clubs and Vocational Programs for women and children who have been exploited or trafficked. We conduct family outreach programs to keep the family intact, and assist the family and community members to help eradicate human trafficking in their villages.
2. With the support of Gimbel Foundation we provide medical services, psychological assistance and housing to some of the most severely trafficked children in Cambodia that other agencies turn away.
- 3.) With the support of Gimbel Foundation we operate vocational programs to educate and train older survivors to become self-supporting. These include jewelry manufacturing, sewing, tailoring, cosmetology, master silk production, mushroom and agriculture programs, English language and computer skills. Currently, we are establishing medical vocational training and pediatric clinics to provide critical medical services to the community while creating a medical vocational training program for young adults.
- 4.) We are fiscally conservative and responsible, and keep administrative expenses at 7% of income.

C. Current Programs and Communities Served: Rapha House conducts anti trafficking outreach services for women and children in Phnom Penh, Battambang, Siem Reap and Women’s Island Cambodia. Cambodia’s family and social structure was devastated by the Khmer Rouge leaving 1 in 4 people dead. Today it is a society of exploited women trying to support children without education, opportunity, assets or income. The young people are intelligent and motivated. Fifty Percent (50%) of the population of Cambodia is under 22 years old and 70% are under 30 years old, mostly uneducated and desperate for a trade or employment.

II: PROJECT INFORMATION: We are seeking funds for two separate areas. Project 1: II.A Statement of Need- The Community benefiting from this program will be Survivors of Child Sex Trafficking, their families villages/communities. **IIB.1 Project Goal :** Develop a Social Worker/Community Outreach Program to assess and deliver exploitation and prevention services to the families and supporting community of Survivors of Child Sex Trafficking so the Survivor can return home safely and become a self-sustaining , role model and leader in their community. This is a cutting edge program to minimize institutionalizing a survivor while simultaneously addressing the issues within the family and surrounding community contributing to incidents of human trafficking related to naivety, poverty, spousal abuse, lack of opportunity and minimal education opportunities. Rapha House personnel understands that child sex trafficking is a systemic problem in Cambodia related to family poverty, lack of education, corruption, and lack of opportunity. When a Survivor returns to her community it is important that we assist in building a support system for her , her mother , her siblings and extended family enabling her to have the foundation necessary to succeed. Rapha House has one of the lowest recidivism rates in Cambodia. We believe that it is essential to address all issues contributing to this crime for the survivor and their families/communities to eradicate this crime. **IIB.2 Objectives/Methodology. 1.)** Train and implement a Rapha House Social Workers program **IIB.2 Activities:** Train RH Social Workers to interview, assess, document and prepare/ implement Action Plans to educate, counsel and create positive reintegration programs for the survivor and their family members based on their specific needs and circumstances. **IIB.2 Objective/Methodology 2.)** Create a safe environment for the survivor to THRIVE in her indigenous community as a self-sustaining role model . **IIB2.Activities** RH Social workers will assess the needs to support the Survivors success and provide appropriate resources through this grant including enrolling male house hold members in vocational

programs to stabilize household income, enrolling mothers in the RH vocational programs for additional income, enrolling younger children in the household in RH Kids Clubs to keep them safe, provide education and instruct them regarding child sex trafficking, assist them in finding other community services e.g. medical assistance etc. **IIB.3 Target Population)** Survivors of Child Sex Trafficking, their family members, their villages and communities. Cambodian families are extended. A survivor could easily influence up to 50 adults/children family members. A typical village or community could influence upwards of 200 people per survivor. We plan to focus on the most immediate influence to provide vocational/employment stabilization for the survivor's family to create a safe home environment while educating the entire community about child sex trafficking . **IIB.4 Existing Projects/Volunteers:** Currently there is little work being done like this in Cambodia. The approach is to provide the survivor with a short term safety program and release them with little or no support system and no focus on the initial issues within the family that resulted in the child becoming a victim. The result is a high recidivism rate as the survivor has little means of income or protection. RH partners with other NGO's in Cambodia and maximizes every resource possible to support our Survivors. In the US RH has nearly a 100% volunteer program to minimize overhead however in Cambodia ALL management and social workers are paid employees so we can control the quality of training and services provided to survivors. **IIC.1 Project Outcomes/Evaluations:** RH will maintain detailed reporting of Social Worker activity including number of family visits, recommendations, follow up programs, vocational enrollment programs etc and will be made available to Gimbel Foundation. **11C.2** The true measure of success will be tracking the success of the individual survivors, their family members and monitoring for a decrease of child sex trafficking activity of other young children in the survivor's community. **11C.3** Vocational enrollment, employment, and successful survivor reintegration will be monitored and a overview reported quarterly for ALL activities of this Social Worker Program. **11D** Funds received from this grant for 1.) Pay and train Social Workers, 2.) Create Interview, Reporting , Recommendation and Follow up documentation, curriculum and community educational materials 3.) Pay for expenses related to travel to Survivors Villages, 4.) Provide computers for report filling and vocational training. **Timeline:** This project will begin immediately upon receipt of grant funds. **Project II. - Medical Vocational Training and Pediatric Clinic Services : 11.A Statement of Need –** There is an urgent need for Medical Vocational Training and employment for adult survivors of sex trafficking delivered through a RH community pediatric clinic. **IIB.1 Project Goal:** The goal is to train a select group of sex trafficking survivors to become EEG technicians and CNAs that will result in quality employment through a RH medical clinic. Once trained the survivors will work in a RH medical clinic delivering medical services to literally hundreds, perhaps thousands of community patients.**11B.1 Methodology:** Purchase an EEG machine for vocational training to establish and deliver a curriculum for EEG Technician/CNA Training programs. Dr. Paul Fleenor, a Pediatric Neurologist has joined the Cambodian Staff of Rapha House and is establishing what may be the only Pediatric Neurology clinic in Cambodia. This provides RH a unique opportunity to offer advanced vocational medical training to a select group of qualified young people to support the medical services being offered by Dr. Paul Fleenor. Every year thousands of children die in Cambodia from lack of medical services. **IIB.2 Objectives: 11B2.1** Provide matching funding to procure a high quality EEG machine to be used for patients and vocational training at the RH medical clinic.**11B.2.1 Activities:** This machine will be used to train a select group of Survivors as EEG Technicians to be employed by the RH Pediatric Clinic and community outreach programs. **11B.2.2 Objectives:** Train up to 6 Adult Sex Trafficking Survivors or Family members to become CNA's and EEG Technicians. **11B.2.2 Activities:** Create and deliver a basic EEG and CNA Training Curriculum and Testing /Certification Program. **11B2.3 Objectives :** Subsidize Students with

scholarships during the 3 month EEG/CNA Training Program. **11B2.3 Activities:** Provide \$40.00 per month per student as a scholarship to assist living expenses during training. The trained medical technicians/CNA's will be employed to deliver Pediatric Neurological services to at risk and impoverished children in Cambodia. **TIME LINE:** This project will begin immediately upon receipt of Grant funds. **IIB.3 Target Population:** Initially a minimum of six survivors will be trained and employed as EEG Technicians/CNA's. We project these students will subsequently serve hundreds/thousands of at risk and impoverished children in Cambodia. There are currently no other Pediatric Neurological services available. This program will be used as a foundation for developing and expanding future medical training for hopefully hundreds of EEG Technicians/CNA students in the future. **11B.4 Other Project/Partners.** Currently there are no other Pediatric neurology services available in most of Cambodia and no medical vocational programs for EEG/CNA training outside of Phnom Penh. Dr Paul Fleenor has established collaborations with the Cambodian medical community and will work closely with other NGOs to provide this much needed service. Dr. Fleenor works closely with various short term Medical Missions coming to Cambodia to serve at risk kids and their families. **IIC Project Outcomes and Evaluations:** Student Training results will be evaluated by a Certification Test at the end of the Training. Records will be kept regarding number of children receiving EEG Testing and number of children served by the trained CNA's. Gimbel Foundation will receive a summary of training activity and medical services delivered using the EEG machine and training curriculum. Volunteers often serve various medical missions that RH may support using this EEG equipment. **II.C.1 Outcomes** RH anticipates this to be the foundation for a significant medical training program and delivery of EEG services in the future as the need for medical testing and pediatric care is enormous in Cambodia. **11.C.2** This program will also elevate the level of vocational training offered to survivors of sex trafficking so they can become professionals and leaders in their communities. When children's lives are saved and neurological conditions diagnosed and treated, this program will be deemed successful. **11.C3** Quarterly reports, photos and updates will be provided to the Gimbel Foundation to track success. The Gimbel Foundation staff is always welcome to come to Cambodia and enjoy the good they are giving to impoverished people that would have no other hope without their generosity. **11D.** Grant Funds will be used to 1.) Help purchase a quality EEG machine, 2.) Create a EEG Technician /CNA Training program, 3.) Provide a short term scholarship to survivors of sex trafficking to attend the training. **III.PROJECT FUTURE:** We believe this is the beginning of a major medical training program now unavailable in Cambodia. It has the potential to provide professional training and employment to young people and save thousands of Cambodian children from illness, disease and death. Hopefully the RH medical clinic will be self-supporting and will contribute to the costs of ongoing medical training but the need is great in Cambodia and it is easy to get engulfed by the overwhelming demand for health care services for children. Rapha House will continue to raise funds to support their ongoing activities to address these challenges.




8. Termination

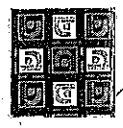
