#### News about grants, gifts

Blue Cross and Blue Shield of North Carolina (BCBSNC) announced the results of its Big 3 3-Point Challenge, a competition between the Duke, UNC-Chapel Hill, and NC State basketball teams to score the most three-point baskets for charity. Duke took the lead of the competition, earning \$20,000 for Duke Children's Hospital, while UNC came in second to donate \$5,000 to the UNC Lineberger Comprehensive Cancer Center. NC State took third place with a \$2,500 donation to the NC State Family Scholarship.

Durham's Partnership for Children has awarded transition to kindergarten minigrants to 11 child care sites and elementary schools through its collaborative Transition to Kindergarten (TTK) Initiative. The grant amounts total \$6,030 to support early educators, elementary schools and child care sites in designing and implementing transition events for their specific student and parent populations. Funds for these mini-grants were made available through a gift from Wells Fargo. The <u>Morgan Creek Foundation</u> also supports the TTK Initiative.

<u>Wake Tech</u> has partnered with the <u>National Financial Educators Council</u> to help students learn to manage funds and make sound fiscal decisions. With support from the <u>SunTrust Foundation</u>, Wake Tech has launched the <u>Center for Financial</u> <u>Education</u>, a comprehensive financial literacy initiative that will offer money management programs for students, employees and members of the community. The SunTrust Foundation has committed \$35,000 to the Center, which will include financial empowerment workshops and special events for students throughout the year.

Second Harvest Food Bank of Northwest NC has received a \$10,000 grant award from the S.L. Gimbel Foundation Advised Fund at The Community Foundation. The funds will be use to purchase staple food items for distribution to partner agencies across an 18-county service area.
