XLIII. <u>Organization/Agency Background</u>: State your mission, vision, purpose, and provide a brief history. What are your core programs and activities? How many people do you serve? How many paid staff, full time and part-time? How many volunteers?

The mission of Southeast Missouri Food Bank (SEMO Food Bank) is to end hunger and leverage the power of food to build a healthy community. We envision a community in which everyone has access to sufficient nutritious food.

Since 1985, SEMO Food Bank has been serving 16 counties in rural Southeast Missouri with food assistance services. Counties served include Bollinger, Butler, Cape Girardeau, Carter, Dunklin, Madison, Mississippi, New Madrid, Pemiscot, Perry, Reynolds, Ripley, Scott, Ste. Genevieve, Stoddard, and Wayne.

Through our programs and services we serve more than 63,000 individuals every month. Our Hunger Relief Member Agency Network is our core program and distributes groceries to 180 food pantries, soup kitchens, and shelters.

Truck to Table Mobile Pantry distributions are held after 5PM increasing client's ability to provide for their families. In 2016, Truck to Table served 35,000 families.

BackPacks For Friday (BFF) sends 11 pounds of food home with children each school-year weekend. BFF serves 811 children identified as "at risk of food insecurity."

A Better Childhood (ABC) Mobile School Pantry serves students and their families in impoverished counties with high rates of enrollment in the free lunch program. ABC provides 40 lbs of food every month at schools, community centers, & churches. In 2016, 490 children and their families were served each month.

In 2016, SEMO Food Bank assisted 218 individuals with Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) applications.

The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) provides food commodities to Southeast Missourians who are food insecure. In 2016, TEFAP distributed over 1.1 million pounds of nutritious food.

Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) meets the nutritional needs of seniors and serves 4,800 low income seniors monthly.

SEMO Food Bank has 19 paid staff. There are 14 full time and 5 part time. We also have more than 700 volunteers.

II. <u>Project Information</u>: Describe your food distribution program. Explain the community need including demographics, geographic characteristics of the area or community to be served, community conditions and income level. What are the specific activities of the food program? How do you identify/qualify those in need? How often is the food distribution offered? How many people will be served by the food distribution program (children, youth, adults, seniors)? Please explain how you keep track of number of people served.

The community to be served by grant funding is Madison County. Surrounded by multiple rivers, this rich farmland is also prone to major flooding. Flooding has caused the loss of crops and desolation of homes. Madison County demographics include White (95.3%) followed by Two or More races (1.8%) and Black (1.8%). Madison County is one of the poorest regions in the state and nationally. The median household income is \$35,097 compared to Missouri (\$45,231). Approximately 69% of residents live at or below 130% of the federal poverty level compared to the Southeast Missouri average (64%) and Missouri average (50%) and the Nation (55%). Widespread poverty makes affording food challenging.

Approximately 38% of SEMO rood bank seniors in Madison County report having diet related chronic diseases – diabetes. This is significantly higher than other senior clients in our service region (45% diabetes). One major modifiable factor in preventing chronic disease is diet. Southeast Missouri (SEMO) Food Bank's seniors want to eat more nutritious food. The most requested item by clients (70%) is produce. However, seniors face barriers when trying to afford a nutritious diet. Furthermore, 11% of clients cannot access refrigerators, so non-perishables are desperately needed.

To respond to this need, SEMO Food Bank provides USDA's Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) to 4,800 seniors each month. While CSFP supplements diets with nutritious USDA commodities (juice, shelf stable milk, canned produce, canned proteins, cereals), it does not provide enough produce for the month. To qualify for CSFP, seniors must be 60 years or older with incomes at or below 130% poverty. Numbers are tracked through spreadsheets created by the Missouri Department of Health.

Increasing access to a consistent nutritious diet is critical to reducing risk factors. FRESH will provide more consistent access to nutritious food and increase likelihood of improved health outcomes.
