I. Organization Background; Target Population:

A) History, Mission & Purpose of Organization

Established in 1929, St. Joseph Hospital is a nonprofit community hospital committed to offering medical care to those in need without regard to demographic characteristics, financial status, or level of insurance. Our **vision** is to *bring people together to provide compassionate care, promote health improvement and create healthy communities*. Our **mission** is to *continually improve the health and quality of life of people in the communities we serve*.

B) Organizational Accomplishments

St. Joseph Hospital combines strong management and financial accountability with medical expertise, technology, research, and caring to create the gold standard in healthcare. Our reputation for clinical excellence and compassionate, family-centered care draws patients from all over the country. Our Hospital is recognized as a top 10 hospital in the Los Angeles/ Orange County metropolitan area by U.S. News & World Report for clinical excellence in seven specialties, among them cancer. We hold a Magnet designation, the nation's highest honor for nursing excellence, from the American Nurses Credentialing Center. St. Joseph Hospital is the only hospital in California and one of only 30 in the nation selected to participate in the National Cancer Institute Community Cancer Centers Program (NCCCP). This affiliation enables our patients to benefit from the latest treatment and technology close to home. Also, the American College of Surgeons, Commission on Cancer granted three-year accreditation to our Hospital.

C) Key Programs & Activities. Communities Served.

St. Joseph Hospital's Center for Cancer Prevention and Treatment (CCPT) is the most comprehensive cancer program in Orange County. It offers world-class cancer care and access to national cancer research, including clinical trials for promising new treatments. The CCPT's Cancer Wellness Program empowers patients and their families to take control of their health by eating a well-balanced diet, maintaining a healthy body weight and engaging in regular exercise. Studies show that leading a healthy lifestyle during cancer treatment can improve a patient's quality of life by boosting their psychological and emotional well-being as well as energy levels. Patients can help prevent cancer recurrence by continuing healthy eating and regular exercise.

Our program will include educational podcasts and materials; interactive healthy eating classes and cooking demonstrations; yoga, Pilates and exercise classes; healthy moments sessions with a behavioral health specialist; and pre-cancer treatment rehabilitation program to help strengthen the body prior to treatment. We currently have Licensed Physical therapists leading our Wellness Classes for survivors. We intend to add a specially trained Wellness Navigator, circuit training and weightlifting classes and educational materials. We will track patient outcomes to assist the survivors in returning to high quality of life and previous level of function.

Although our primary service area is central Orange County, our hospital provides comprehensive care throughout the county and the surrounding areas. This includes some of the poorest communities in Southern California – including some in Santa Ana – a city previously determined by the Nelson A. Rockefeller Institute of Government in a report titled “Update on Urban Hardship” as being the most difficult urban area in the United States in which to live.

II. Project Information:

A) Statement of Need

The World Health Organization predicts the global burden of cancer will grow by 70% over the next two decades. In that same time the number of cancer cases that occur in the U.S. is expected to surge to over 50% higher than the current rates. The California Department of Health Services predicts that over 12,000 people living in Orange County will be newly diagnosed with cancer in the next 12 months. Fortunately, about one-third of these cases can be prevented by eating a healthy diet, being physically active and keeping off excess weight. According to the American Cancer Society (ACS) the cancer risk factors that can be changed are body weight, diet, and physical activity. In the United States, excess body weight is thought to contribute to as many as 1 out of 5 of all cancer-related deaths. Being overweight is clearly linked with an increased risk of cancer including: Breast, Colon and Pancreatic cancer. In addition to cancer prevention, exercise can greatly contribute to recovery from cancer and a reduction in recurrence. Thanks to advancements in cancer research, treatment and early detection, the number of cancer survivors in the United States has quadrupled in the last 40 years and it continues to grow.

While an increase in cancer survivorship is great news, it brings new challenges. New and aggressive cancer treatments are saving lives; these treatments are also taking a toll on the physical and psychological health of patients. Each cancer survivor can expect to experience several of the following, either as symptoms of their disease or as side-effects of their treatment, or both: Difficulty with daily activities such as dressing, chores, and shopping, Difficulty returning to work and recreational or community activities, Pain, Weakness, Fatigue, Joint stiffness, Balance and gait problems, Memory and concentration issues, Bowel and bladder dysfunction, Swallowing difficulty, Lymphedema, Emotional strain, and Depression. Many symptoms can be severe and debilitating.

When cancer survivors have pain, fatigue, weakness, depression and/or other difficult symptoms they often feel as though they can only sit or lay around. They feel too bad to move. Such inactivity only exacerbates the problems they face. Cancer survivors need rehabilitative exercise, yet most do not receive the help they need to develop helpful exercise routines. Many are afraid to move for fear of causing additional damage. They need help to know what types of exercise are safe for them and what will help them. Our rehabilitation focuses on getting patients moving through therapeutic exercise allowing them to move more quickly and more completely towards the recovery of lost functions and improvement in the quality of their lives. Our Cancer Wellness classes and education provide the ongoing support patients need to help them through recovery.

B) Project Goal, Objectives & Methodology

St. Joseph Hospital is committed to ensuring that Orange County residents who will be diagnosed with cancer in the future, and those already diagnosed with cancer, have access to excellent care in an environment of serenity, peacefulness and revitalization with everything they need all within our newly created cancer center. The care we provide through our Cancer Wellness program helps patients to maintain or re-establish quality of life at different stages of the disease. Research shows exercise during cancer treatments can help reduce the severity of side effects like fatigue and depression, while improving energy levels and helping to prevent unwanted weight gain. We begin working with patients early to help them restore as much physical, psychological, social, vocational, recreational, and economic function as possible.

Regular, moderate exercise is found to not only reduce risk of cancer but also to help with cancer recovery. The ACS recommends that cancer survivors return to normal daily activities as soon as possible after treatment and include exercise of at least 30 minutes five or more days a week with

strength training at least 2 days per week. We intend to offer expanded program classes and services to 300 Cancer Wellness patients during a one-year period.

Objective I: Expand Cancer Wellness program offerings

Activities: We will provide education and classes to an increased number of cancer patients as a part of their survivorship. We will incorporate educational materials, light weightlifting and circuit training into our program during the first quarter of 2016.

Objective II: Track patient wellness outcomes

Activities: We will develop a wellness outcome, tracking system for patients and survivors during the last quarter of 2015. We will monitor increased levels of strength, coordination and endurance through either patient written diaries or by using a personal online format in 2016.

C) Project Outcomes & Evaluation

The overall outcome is that patients to take necessary steps to increase quality of life during and after cancer treatment. Patients learn to eat a well-balanced diet, maintain a healthy body weight and participate in regular exercise during treatment, which can boost their psychological and emotional well-being as well as their energy levels. After treatment, patients continue these healthy habits to help prevent recurrence. We will use our newly developed tracking system to evaluate our project success, following individual wellness outcomes such as increased muscle mass and muscle strength, endurance and flexibility and improved functional ability.

D) How Grant Funds Will Be Used

Grant funds will be used to purchase circuit training and light weightlifting equipment.

A) How Project Will Be Supported After Grant Period

We will incorporate classes and activities into the program offerings for our cancer patients and survivors and if shown effective we will be able to budget for these classes in future years.

Pam Hockett RN, MSN, OCN was an oncology nurse for 35 years, an experienced health care leader with extensive experience in hospital operation management, program development, research, quality, regulatory compliance, facility design-build, in the acute care inpatient and out-patient settings, she is the Executive Director of the Center for Cancer Prevention and Treatment.

Dear Sir/Madam:

This responds to your June 5, 2013, request for information regarding the status of your group tax exemption.

Our records indicate that you were issued a determination letter in March 1946, that you are currently exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, and are not a private foundation within the meaning of section 509(a) of the Code because you are described in sections 509(a)(1) and 170(b)(1)(A)(i).

With your request, you provided a copy of the *Official Catholic Directory for 2013*, which includes the names and addresses of the agencies and instrumentalities and the educational, charitable, and religious institutions operated by the Roman Catholic Church in the United States, its territories, and possessions that are subordinate organizations under your group tax exemption. Your request indicated that each subordinate organization is a non-profit organization, that no part of the net earnings thereof inures to the benefit of any individual, and that no substantial part of their activities is for promotion of legislation. You have further represented that none of your subordinate organizations is a private foundation under section 509(a), although all subordinates do not all share the same sub-classification under section 509(a). Based on your representations, the subordinate organizations in the *Official Catholic Directory for 2013* are recognized as exempt under section 501(c)(3) of the Code under GEN 0928.

Donors may deduct contributions to you and your subordinate organizations as provided in section 170 of the Code. 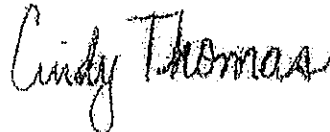

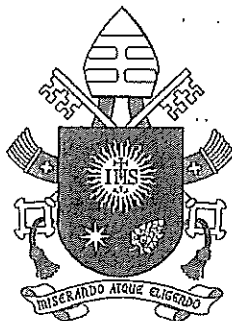

The Community Foundation may terminate this agreement, withhold payments, or both at any time, if, in the Community Foundation’s judgment: a) The Community Foundation is not satisfied with the quality of the Grantee’s progress toward achieving the project goals and objectives; b) the Grantee dissolves or fails to operate; c) the Grantee fails to comply with the terms and conditions of this agreement.

9. Limitation of Support

This Agreement contains the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the Grant and supersedes any previous oral or written understandings or agreements.
