2014 S.L. Gimbel Foundation Fund Application Narrative

What is the history, mission and/or purpose of your organization? How long has the organization been providing programs and services to the community?

We here at T.A.R.A. are addressing the greatest causes of animal suffering - pet overpopulation. Our mission is to reduce the number of unwanted cats and dogs coming into a system that cannot hold them. Our organization, The Animal Rights Alliance, Inc. (T.A.R.A.) operates a low-cost, high-volume, feline mobile spay/neuter clinic in its 12th year of operation. In addition to our mobile clinic for cats, we opened a stationary spay and neuter clinic, primarily for dogs, in April 2014. We have serviced over 85,000 cats in 12 years and over 600 dogs in the last year and a half, 335 of which were in the last three months at our stationary clinic.

What are some of your past organizational accomplishments (last three years)?

Best accomplishment was our new mobile clinic for cats begun on September 19, 2011. It was built by LaBoit and designed by co-founder, Stephen Tardif, specifically made to best meet the needs of the animals and the clientele. It is expected to last 15+ years and is designed to ensure efficiency and user-friendly capabilities. Top accomplishment for 2013 was that we exceeded 80,000 cat spays and neuters to include 231 dogs. Best, to date, in 2014 is our stationary clinic which can perform low-cost, high, volume spays and neuters for dogs of all sizes, especially pit bulls and pit mixes. We're shooting for 8,000 cat spays and 3,675 dog ones. This would exceed 95,000 cats and 4,000 dogs between both clinics.

What are your key programs and activities? Describe the communities you serve. Include populations, geographic locations served, and relevant statistics.

Our key programs are the mobile spay/neuter clinic for cats and stationary spay/neuter clinic, in Middletown, New York, primarily for dogs. We are also offering weekly, low-cost, vaccine clinics for spayed and neutered cats and dogs at our stationary location. Our clinics are open to the public with no residency restrictions. The mobile has regularly scheduled clinics in Orange and Sullivan counties but also travels to Putnam, Dutchess, and Ulster counties for special events. We additionally keep records of low-income areas with unaltered animals, as reported by the public and animal welfare organizations. Our research shows there are approximately 141,729 people living below the poverty line in the five New York counties surrounding the stationary clinic location. This population group owns an estimated 31,889 unsterilized dogs and 38,653 unsterilized cats, along with 83,212 free-roaming cats.

We would like to expand our ability to offer services at an even lower rate to low-income areas and to low-income individuals. We presently offer reduced prices, on a case-by-case basis, but we would like to increase our ability to do so. There is a very large, local, demand for dog services, especially the pit and pit mixes, which comprise the majority.

State your project goal. Describe your project. How does your project meet the community need? What is unique and innovative about this project?

Our services, while considered low-cost, are perhaps not low-cost enough. A lower price would bring more people to us to do the right thing. We would like to use the grant funds to subsidize

\$100 more off some 250 pit bull surgeries. We are the only low-cost spay/neuter clinic in the Hudson Valley and there are no pit bull specific, spay/neuter subsidy programs for them.

Objective I: Advertising

Activities:

The T.A.R.A. clinic will first launch widespread advertising to make the community aware of our new project. T.A.R.A. clinic information is already routinely printed in approximately 15 regional newspapers and newsletters. We will also use fliers, social media, and website updates. Best advertising – word of mouth!

Objective II: Appointing Scheduling

Activities: Once funding is received, animals will be scheduled, services rendered, and records compiled.

Objective III: Continual project assessment and the final impact of success

Activities: Continual problem solving and accommodation of arising project needs will be an ongoing factor during the entirety of the project. At the six month mark, our goal is to have completed at least 125 sterilizations. We will continually monitor our progress toward meeting this goal. At the completion of the project, we will assess the final impact and success of the project.

Provide a timeline for implementing the project

If we received the \$25,000 grant for 250 pit bulls we will set a one-year timeline.

Who will this grant serve? Describe your target population. How many people will be impacted? Provide a breakdown: Number of Children, Youth, Adults, Seniors, Animals. Include a detailed list of activities and number of participants for each activity.

We will target any and all qualifying pit bulls. We especially seek to advertise our services to low-income residents. We seek to target specific areas of financial need, based on US census data related to income and poverty statistics. Persons receiving public assistance and those who adopt from qualifying agencies compose an extremely large demographic in this area. Children, youth, adults and seniors will benefit from less free-roaming feral or vicious unaltered dogs. Dog bites and/or attacks cost municipalities a very large sum of money.

How does this project relate to other existing projects in the community? Who else in the community is providing this service or has a similar project? Who are your community partners (if any)? How are you utilizing volunteers?

A pit bull spay/neuter project relates to T.A.R.A.'s existing feline projects. Unfortunately, there are no other organizations within the Hudson Valley that provide the volume or quality services that we do. T.A.R.A. regularly collaborates with numerous rescue organizations, shelters, and humane societies throughout the region as a low-cost spay/neuter service provider. We have a small volunteer base that helps with street fairs and fundraising. Our clinics are all run by paid professionals, committed to achieving our goals, on a daily basis.

What are the key anticipated outcomes of the project and impact on participants?

This grant will be used to spay/neuter 250 pit bulls for a population of residents who may not otherwise be able to afford to do so. This will greatly enhance the well-being of the dogs and allow their guardians to become responsible caretakers.

How will you know if you have achieved the expected outcomes?

We will know once we've successfully completed the spaying and neutering of 250 pit bulls.

How will progress towards the objectives be tracked and outcomes measured?

T.A.R.A. keeps detailed appointment, surgical, legal, and billing records for all human and animal clients. We continually seek to better serve, and to maintain a highly transparent and accountable operating system. We will monitor our success along the way in order to meet the proposed goal within a six month to a year period.

How will you use the grant funds?

One hundred percentage of grant funding will go towards the cost of pit bull spay/neuter. Our prices vary by sex and weight. We start at \$120 for a male dog, under 35 pounds and go up to \$200 for a female dog between 60 and 100 pounds. We will give each pit bull surgery a \$100 discount. This will give no one a reason not to fix their pit!

Explain how you will support this project after the grant performance period.

T.A.R.A. has a longstanding history of reaching out for funding for our projects and goals. We have been successful, to date, because we are dedicated to the successful completion of all projects we start. If we receive funding from you, we will do the same, and use this success to ask for funding from others. All this will be done while we continue to offer our low-services to all, both during and after.

Describe your board of directors and the role it plays in the organization. What committees exist within your board of directors? How does the board of directors make decisions?

The board of directors consists of four people. The President, Rose Tardif, and Vice President, Stephen Tardif, are actively involved in the daily operations of the organization. We are a small grassroots organization that has open discussions when making decisions. Barbara Rea is our secretary and Sallianne Sosler is a director and volunteer bookkeeper.

Describe the qualifications of key personnel/staff responsible for the project.

Rose Tardif, is president and co-founder of T.A.R.A., Inc. Rose manages the daily operations of the organization which include the preparation and the needs of the mobile and stationary units and their functions, .i.e., payroll, bookkeeping, outreach, and fundraising events. Stephen Tardif, vice president is co-founder, and veterinary assistant. Stephen is a member of the daily clinic staff, assisting the veterinarians and supervising daily operations. He has over 25 years experience with animal care and over ten years experience as operations' director. Annemarie Campbell is office manager and director of development. Annemarie manages the daily client scheduling, advertising, record keeping, and other tasks related to the operation of the mobile and stationary clinics. All five of our veterinarians are N.Y. licensed and we have two licensed veterinary technicians. Other personnel include a receptionist and appointment maker, as well as a part-time animal handler.



Dear Applicant:

This modifies our letter of the above date in which we stated that you would be treated as an organization which is not a private foundation until the expiration of your advance ruling period.

Your exempt status under section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code as an organization described in section 501(c)(3) is still in effect. Based on the information you submitted, we have determined that you are not a private foundation within the meaning of section 509(a) of the code because you are an organization of the type described in section 509(a)(1) and 170(b)(1)(A)(vi).

Grantors and contributors may rely on this determination unless the Internal Revenue Service publishes notice to the contrary. However, if you lose your section 509(a)(1) status, a grantor or contributor may not rely on this determination if he or she was in part responsible for, or was aware of, the act or failure to act, or the substantial or material change on the part of the organization that resulted in your loss of such status, or if he or she acquired knowledge that the Internal Revenue Service had given notice that you would no longer be classified as a section 509(a)(1) organization.



1. Use of Grant Funds

Grant funds must be expended within the grant period, for the purpose and objectives described in your grant proposal. Grant funds may not be expended for any other purpose without prior written approval by The Community Foundation. If there are significant difficulties in making use of the funds as specified in your proposal, or if the grant funds cannot be spent within the grant period, notify us in writing promptly.

Formal requests for extensions or variances must be submitted to the Foundation's Board of Directors for approval a minimum of 60 days before the end of the grant period.

Requests for variances or extensions are reviewed on a case-by-case basis and approved by the Board of Directors. If a request is denied, unused funds must be immediately refunded to the Foundation.

2. Payment of Grant Funds

The grant funds will be paid in full by the Foundation upon receipt of the signed Grant Agreement. Challenge grant funds will be paid in full upon receipt of the signed Grant Agreement and upon receipt of documentation providing evidence that condition(s) of the challenge grant has/have been met.

3. Certification and Maintenance of Exempt Organization Status

This grant is specifically conditioned upon Grantee's status as an eligible grantee of The Community Foundation. The Foundation has obtained a copy of the Grantee's IRS determination letter. Grantee confirms that it has not had any change in its tax-exempt status, and shall notify the Foundation immediately of any such change.

4. Final Report and Records

The Grantee will submit the Grant Evaluation report per the deadline set forth in the award letter. This report includes a narrative on outcomes based on goals and objectives set forth in the grant proposal and an expenditure report documenting use of grant funds. If equipment was purchased, copies of receipts need to be included.

5. Grantee's Financial Responsibilities

Grantee will keep records of receipts and expenditures of grant funds and other supporting documentation related to the grant at least four (4) years after completion of the grant and will make such records of receipts, expenditures and supporting documentation available to the Foundation upon request.

6. Publicity

The Community Foundation recommends publicity for the grant and acknowledging The Community Foundation in internal correspondence, brochures as appropriate; newsletters, annual reports and email blasts or e-newsletters.
