Fro one school year, this program would bring 20 classes each semester for a half day tour of the galleries, a free art workshop, and a curriculum guide with web links where they can find more information about the art, artist, and type of art.	
Summary of Final Accomplishments (no more than 150 words):	When completed, the Muckenthaler will have hosted approximately 1200 students from 11 different elementary schools. Also students from 2 different high schools and a number of other organizations attended. The students were provided, free of charge, tours of the museum, the gallery, and given a free art workshop. The program included interactive study sheets for the students and a study guide for the teachers to take home.

Due to summer and winter break, the remaining classes from the surrounding La Habra School District and Placentia/Yorba Linda School District will be touring though-out the months of February and March. This will fulfill the requirements of the grant.



#### **Narrative**

The program begins with Zoot Velasco, the Executive Director, giving a brief history of Orange County, the early families, the individuals who founded the county, and their link to the Muckenthaler family. Through a question and answer session, the students were quizzed on the various attributes of their county and personages therein. One of the major successes of this portion was the ability of the Executive Director to connect with the kids, establish a report with them, and tie in the local history for the children to understand the connections. The classes are then broken up into two groups.

One group is taken to the Muckenthaler house by Matthew Leslie, the museum curator. On the house tour, Mr. Leslie interacts with the students regarding the numerous architectural and interior attributes of the Muckenthaler estate and the exhibition gallery. He explained a brief history of the artists in the exhibit, the numerous works, and the artistic mediums represented. Following the discussion and tour of the gallery, students would then be divided into numerous small groups, given a work sheet on which they would have to answer questions by searching the gallery's works. The questions are designed to have the students search every piece of art for various attributes such as colors, subject matter, numbers of objects, and/or interpretation.

The second group is taken to the art studio where they take part in an art activity created and taught by Lead Artist Willie Tabata. In one such activity, students learn the fundamentals of printing techniques using foam plates, ballpoint pen, and acrylic paints. Each student uses a pen to create a design on the underside of the foam plate. Pressure from the pen will create a shallow relief on the surface of the plate. Then a discussion and application of the nature of the image being in the reverse by writing their names backwards and in the reverse along the completed design. Then students will select from the primary colors and discuss the properties of mixing two colors to create the secondary colors. Final step is the paint applied sparingly with a small cosmetic sponge then immediately pressed onto construction paper and lifted off to reveal the design that is now printed with their name correctly written. Student will print with various colors and several times on one sheet of large construction paper to create a fold out book.

The groups will then rotate; the groups that toured the gallery will then go to the art activity, and vise versa. These programs usually last anywhere from 1 ½ to 2 ½ hours.

The funding provided by the OCCF & SL Gimbel Foundation Fund will have allowed approximately 1200 children to attend the programs while other matching funds allowed the acquisition of a school bus to allow students from more distant schools to attend.

Further matching funding of \$16,500 from Rotary International, was received to further expand our schools tours and expand the program. This amount was used to purchase supplies needed for the program as well as expand the program to include a book arts printing making section. Remaining amounts were raised through fund raising efforts.

The final accomplishment has been an incredible success, bringing over to 1200 students from all over the city and county to the Muckenthaler to tour the historical home, explore the gallery, and participate



in an art workshop. Participants from 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> grade classes from local schools: Golden Hill Foundation Elementary, Richman Elementary, Fern Elementary, Maple Elementary and Valencia Park. Also, an additional 20 classes from neighboring La Habra City School District and Placentia/Yorba Linda School District will be attending, bringing the total number of classes to 40, totaling approximately 1200 students. In addition, various other student groups also attended, Sunny Hills and Fullerton High Schools brought students to the Muck. Fullerton College and California State University Fullerton classes also toured the exhibitions. Visitors also included senor groups from Morningside. This number being approximately 100 additional visitors.

The response from the teachers has been overwhelmingly positive due to our ability to interact and connect with the students as well as representing the Visual and Performing Standards (VAPA) along with the California Content Standards for Social Studies in the tour.

A matching donation from the Rotary International to procure supplies for this program also allowed us to purchase numerous other items required to expand our art programs to include a book arts and printing class.

Two obstacles caused problems. The first was some schools were unable to attend before the September 15<sup>th</sup> deadline due to the crunch before the summer break and will have to attend in later in the year and into the next. The other, and most problematic, it was difficult to find any organizations that would cover the cost and responsibility of the schools bus. We were very fortunate to have the Muckenthaler's own auxiliary group, Center Circle, cover the cost of two school busses capable of bringing 144 students and funding from the Irvine Foundation grant to cover the busing costs of two largely lesser affluent Hispanic populated schools.

We have been able to fulfill the requirements of the grant by bringing students not only from our own school districts in Fullerton, but also from surrounding cities of La Habra, Yorba Linda, and Placentia.

As mentioned in the final report of the grant, we discovered that many schools could not attend our programs due to costs associated with transportation.
