I. Organization Background; Target Population:

A) What is the history, mission and/or purpose of your organization? How long has the organization been providing programs and services to the community?

VLPP's mission is to ensure that individuals and families have the freedom, information, and ability to make their own informed reproductive choices. We believe that each individual has a basic right to control his/her reproductive life. Individual control will lead to a better quality of life and stronger families and communities. Reproductive health decisions must be voluntary and private. VLPP has been providing reproductive health care services to the Greater Richmond Metropolitan area for over 65 years and received its 501c3 status in 1942. In January of 2015, VLPP merged with Planned Parenthood of Southeastern Virginia (PPSEV), which has expanded our service area to include the Greater Hampton Roads Metropolitan area. VLPP operates three

B) What are some of your past organizational accomplishments (last three years)? Over the last three years, VLPP has seen a number of organizational accomplishments. We launched a primary care pilot program at our Richmond health center, and in the summer of 2014, we hired a full-time primary care physician who serves as our Director of Primary Care. We are continuing to expand our robust education program in order to reach youth and young adults who are at high risk for unintended pregnancy and STIs. In September 2015, during our first year as a merged organization, VLPP received a renewal of a federal PREP grant, which allows us to continue to provide age-appropriate, comprehensive sex education to high-risk youth in Hampton Roads. In November 2015, VLPP launched a sexual wellness pilot program for women and gender nonconforming people who are 18 and older called Pleasure 101. These workshops are offered at all three of VLPP's health centers.

C) What are your key programs and activities? Describe the communities you serve. VLPP's service area encompasses 50 cities and counties in the Greater Richmond and Greater Hampton Roads areas. Many cities and counties throughout our service area have teen pregnancy rates substantially higher than the state rate of 14 per 1,000 teen girls (2013): Richmond (41.3), Petersburg (73.8), Hopewell (41.1), Colonial Heights (22.4), Virginia Beach (15.3), Norfolk (31), Hampton (20), Newport News (23.9), and Portsmouth (33.9). The STI rates throughout much of our service area are also higher than the state rates. The cities of Hampton (547.9), Newport News (581.3), Norfolk (995.4), and Portsmouth (774.4) have significantly higher HIV prevalence rates than the rest of Hampton Roads and most localities within Virginia. These cities also report STI incidence rates that are much higher than STI rates across the region. VLPP provides a full range of high-quality, affordable reproductive healthcare services at our Richmond, Virginia Beach, and Hampton health centers, including annual exams, diagnosis and treatment of precancerous cervical conditions, sexually transmitted disease screenings and treatment, abortion services, and primary care services. VLPP provides medically accurate, research-based sexuality education in schools and in communities throughout our service area and works to equip young people with tools essential to reducing the teen pregnancy rate and reducing the risk of STIs. Our advocacy team works to protect, maintain, and expand access to reproductive health, education, and choice by engaging supporters of women's health initiatives.

II. Project Information:

A) Statement of Need

1. Specify the community need you want to address and are seeking funds for.

Older teens are at the highest risk for unintended pregnancy and STIs. Teens from low-income backgrounds, those who have experienced violence, those in foster care or correctional facilities, and those with disabilities are at an even higher risk, as many of these youth have histories of abuse, neglect, and a greater history of instability. Only half (51%) of all teen mothers get a high school diploma before the age of 22, compared to 89% of women who did not have a teen birth. Only two percent of teen mothers go on to get a college degree by age 30. Despite the profound impact of teen pregnancy for both teen mother and child, there are few comprehensive sexuality education programs in our service area. Reduced state funding for sexuality education over the past decade has left large gaps in information and nearly no delivery of comprehensive sexuality education programs that directly address teen pregnancy and STIs.

The education program outlined in this proposal takes place in the city of Newport News. Newport News has a population of 182,965. The median household income is \$51,027, which is \$12,880 lower than the state median income of \$63,907. 23% of children live in poverty in Newport News, and 63.6% of children qualified for free or reduced lunch during the 2014-2015 academic year. Newport News has substantially higher rates of teen pregnancy and STI rates than the overall state rates. The rate of teen pregnancy in Newport News is 23.9, nearly twice the state rate of 14.4 per 1,000 teen girls. The STI rates in Newport News are also significantly higher than the state rates. Gonorrhea (274.1 per 100,000) occurs at a rate nearly three times higher than the state average, chlamydia (986.7 per 100,000) at nearly 2.5 times the state average, and syphilis (13.7 per 100,000) at 2 times the state average.

B) Project Goal, Objectives and Methodology

1. State your project goal. Describe your project. How does your project meet the community need? What is unique and innovative about this project?

VLPP's goal is to reduce the teen pregnancy rate and STI rates in Newport News by providing comprehensive sex education to youth so they are able to make healthy and empowered decisions about their futures. Reaching youth at this time in their lives is ideal, especially youth who are at high risk of experiencing an unintended pregnancy or STI. In our tenth-grade health program in Newport News Public Schools (NNPS), every student enrolled in Health II from eight different high schools will participate in seven and a half hours of instructional lessons (five class sessions) during school hours. The curriculum will be delivered by a qualified health educator, and complies with the Virginia State Standards of Learning (SOLs) for tenth-grade family life. During the program, students will be taught comprehensive, age-appropriate and medically accurate information about sexual health and will participate in educational activities that will help them make healthy choices, demonstrate healthy behaviors, and give them the tools to stay safe. This program reaches approximately 2,000 youth in NNPS each year.

2. State up to three objectives. Specify the activities you will undertake to meet each objective.

Objective I: Youth who participate in VLPP's tenth-grade family life program in NNPS will demonstrate statistically significant increases (15%) in knowledge about sexual health and show significant improvements in knowledge about sexual health topics.

Activities: VLPP's Health Educators will provide research-based sexuality education programs to youth at high risk of unintended pregnancy and STIs in NNPS.

Activities: VLPP's Health Educators will give a pretest at the beginning of VLPP's program and a posttest at the conclusion of the program to all program participants.

Objective II: Youth who participate in VLPP's education programs in NNPS will be more likely to engage in healthy behaviors that will protect themselves or their partner from pregnancy and/or STIs.

Activities: VLPP's Health Educators will provide research-based sexuality education programs to youth at high risk of unintended pregnancy and STIs in NNPS.

Activities: VLPP's Health Educators will give a pretest at the beginning of VLPP's program and a posttest at the conclusion of the program to all program participants.

3. Provide a timeline for implementing the project.

Start/End Dates: July 1, 2016-June 30, 2017

VLPP's education programs are offered throughout the year, and the program schedules usually coincide with the academic calendars of the local public school systems. New programs typically begin during the spring, summer, and fall of each year. VLPP aims to reach at least 2,000 youth during the spring, summer, and fall semesters. During the summer, VLPP plans to offer community education programs, review all educational materials for medical accuracy, develop new educational materials, and explore new partnerships.

- 4. Who will this grant serve? How many people will be impacted?
- This grant will support our programs that reach youth at the highest risk for unintended pregnancy and STIs in NNPS. VLPP has worked with NNPS to develop a tenth-grade family life curriculum that best suits the needs of the participants and meets all state-mandated requirements for sex education. A total of 2,001 youth participated in VLPP's tenth-grade family life education program in NNPS between September 2014 and July 2015. We expect this program to serve approximately 2,000 youth each year as we work to help change the course of future peninsula health profiles.
- 5. How does this project relate to other existing projects in the community? VLPP works with the following public high schools in Newport News: Achievable Dream High School, Denbigh High School, Enterprise Academy, Heritage High School, Menchville High School, Warwick High School, Woodside High School, and Point Option High School.

VLPP received a federal PREP Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP) grant in September 2015 to support education programming for the ninth-grade family life curriculum in NNPS for the next three years. VLPP's tenth-grade family life curriculum builds upon this ninth-grade curriculum and includes information about pregnancy prevention, STI prevention, healthy communication, healthy relationships, dating violence, fetal development, and family planning.

C) Project Outcomes and Evaluation

1. What are the key anticipated outcomes of the project and impact on participants? The anticipated outcome of the project is that youth who participate in VLPP's tenth-grade family life program in NNPS will demonstrate statistically significant increases (15%) in knowledge about sexual health and show significant improvements in attitudes related to risk reduction at the end of the program, and that youth who participate in VLPP's education programs will be more likely to make healthy choices to protect themselves or their partner from pregnancy and/or STIs.

2. How will you know if you have achieved the expected outcomes? Evaluation results have shown the program is making a positive impact and is giving youth information they need to make healthy decisions. During the fall 2014 semester, participants in VLPP's tenth-grade family life program showed a 17.52% increase in knowledge about adolescent development, communication, healthy relationships, fetal development, and pregnancy. During the spring 2015 and summer 2015 semesters, participants showed an 18.78% increase in knowledge about adolescent development, communication, healthy relationships, fetal development, and pregnancy.

Program effectiveness will be determined by evaluating the increase in test scores among all participants. When all of the pretest and posttest scores are compiled, participants will demonstrate at least a 15% increase in knowledge and statistically significant improvements in attitudes toward risk reduction. Teen pregnancy rates and STI rates are collected by the Virginia Department of Health. As a result of increased access to education services and preventive healthcare services, we expect the teen pregnancy and STI rates to decline in Newport News.

3. How will progress towards the objectives be tracked and outcomes measured? All participants will be given a pretest at the beginning of VLPP's program and a posttest at the conclusion of the program. Data will be collected and compiled using Datalink equipment and software, and then coded and analyzed using SPSS. VLPP will review aggregate data collected and made available by the Virginia Department of Health about the incidence of reportable STIs, including chlamydia, gonorrhea, syphilis, and HIV/AIDS, as well as teen pregnancy. Program effectiveness will be determined by evaluating the increase in test scores among all participants.

D) How will you use the grant funds?

Grant funds will be used to support the salary of a full-time Health Educator and program needs for the tenth-grade family life program in NNPS.

III. Project Future

Explain how you will support this project after the grant performance period. Our education program has grown substantially over the past several years. We have established an endowment fund for education to sustain programming in the future, and we continue to look for grant funding and individual support to maintain the program.

IV. Governance, Executive Leadership and Key Personnel/Staff Qualifications

- A) Describe your board of directors and the role it plays in the organization. The board of directors' purpose is to establish the legal and corporate existence of the affiliate and to assume overall accountability for its actions. The board of directors meets four times per year. The following committees operate within our board: Executive, Governance, Finance, Fund Development, and Medical Committees.
- B) Describe the qualifications of key personnel/staff responsible for the project. Paulette McElwain, VLPP's CEO, joined VLPP in 2004 and has served as CEO since 2007. In the decade under her leadership, VLPP has grown significantly in size, scope and impact. The organization now serves more than 20,000 women each year. Emily Yeatts joined VLPP as Education Manager in July 2012, and has served as the affiliate's Education Director since 2014. A'ra Alston joined VLPP as a Health Educator in 2015, where she teaches comprehensive sex education programs throughout Hampton Roads, including in partnership with NNPS.

- 1. Personnel: Health Educator: The Health Educator will be responsible for implementing the tenth-grade family life program in Newport News Public Schools: 40 hours/week, \$36,500 (salary) + \$7,300 (benefits) =\$43,800
- 2. Equipment: The Health Educator will need a laptop: \$1,200
- 3. Office Supplies: Office supplies required for program implementation include paper, pencils, markers, staplers, flip charts, etc.: \$300
- 4. Program Supplies: Program supplies required for program implementation include pamphlets, flash cards, DVDs, and visual aids: \$1,200
- 5. Staff Training: Ongoing training on best practices in sexuality education will be imperative to delivering high quality programs. Planned Parenthood and other leading organizations in the field offer various training opportunities throughout the year for education staff about a wide variety of topics, including LGBTQ inclusivity, trauma-informed practice, classroom management, and strategies for meeting the needs of high risk populations. The Hampton health center is only open two days per week to patients, but the education staff uses the office even on non-clinic days.
