Today, we offer a range of exceptional programs in education, mental health, autism, adoption, residential care, prevention and early intervention that are nurturing and accessible to over 5,800 children and families annually.

#### Statement of Need

Vista Del Mar's K-12 non-public school serves up to 350 children a year who have been referred to us by public school districts around Los Angeles due to their difficulties in succeeding in a traditional classroom environment. About half of our students are children with developmental disabilities such as autism spectrum disorder, and the other half are those with learning disabilities or social, emotional, and behavioral problems.

A key component in engaging these children is our Therapeutic Arts Enrichment Program, which offers a wide variety of therapeutic arts classes. These classes are available to any student at The Vista School for whom they are an appropriate method of reaching their educational goals. It is one of our most successful programs, and is now in its 10th year.

Many children at Vista Del Mar have a history of severe trauma including neglect, and/or physical and emotional abuse. For them, arts classes become a critical adjunct to their therapy by providing them with a safe and creative environment to express emotions that may previously have been dormant. Research shows that, rather than acting out by becoming violent or aggressive, students enrolled in arts classes learn a conscious and positive way to express themselves.

Because of their emotional disturbances, many students at Vista Del Mar are also at risk of dropping out of school altogether. Research shows that an arts education can be instrumental in encouraging students to attend class.

Arts education programs also have a tremendous impact on the developmental growth of children, and are effective in helping developmentally delayed children, such as those on the Autism Spectrum, enhance motor control and other.

Unfortunately, despite the benefits this program imparts to our students, the reimbursements from local school districts is inadequate to support it. Therefore, this program is entirely funded by private donors and foundations.

## **Project Description**

Offered as a part of our accredited, non-public school curriculum, Vista Del Mar's Arts Enrichment Program includes elective classes in:

- Theater Arts: Acting, dance, sign language and voice lessons are offered to elementary, middle, and high school students on a daily basis. At the end of each semester, students showcase their work in a live stage performance, giving every student the opportunity to experience live theater. These classes build self-esteem, teach social skills through collaboration with others, and allow expression of emotions in a safe environment.
- Theater Production: This class offers instruction on stage management, lighting, sound, set design and coordination with other aspects of a theater production.
- Music/Instrument Workshop: This daily class provides high school students with an overview of musical genres, music history, instrument families, world music and basic notation. Students also have the option of learning to play guitar, bass guitar, piano, harp, recorder, and woodwind instruments. Listening activities are included in each day, and students write music reviews, and are tested on what they have learned. Students also learn how to record, mix, and edit their own music. This class gives students a unique opportunity to develop their creative potential, develop a greater appreciation of music, and acquire career skills.
- Fine Arts: Offered daily to middle and high school students and weekly to elementary school students. Classes include critique and analysis of past and current artists, observational drawing skills, and using a variety of media to express artistic creation.
- Ceramics: Available to all students, this weekly class focuses on "hand building" projects, including pinch pots, coil pots, and slab building. Students learn how to glaze their creations and about the properties of clay and the chemical reactions that occur as it transforms from gray mud into a permanent artifact. Since many students have a low tolerance for frustration, this class helps students to learn how to deal with frustration by correcting their mistakes, re-doing projects, and coping with the possibility that their pieces may not come out the way they intended.

When appropriate, classes include field trips to museums, art galleries, and other appropriate venues to enhance the overall learning process. Twice each year, students are encouraged to showcase their work either via a theatric performance, an exhibit, or at Vista Del Mar events.

Our therapeutic Arts Enrichment Program is vital to helping our children achieve their goals; in fact, many children who reach their goals as stated in their IEP choose to remain at Vista Del Mar because these classes are not currently available in the public school system.

## 1. Project Goal and Objective

GOAL: Enroll all eligible students at Vista Del Mar in one or more therapeutic arts classes to help them progress towards the goals documented in their Individualized Education Plan (IEP) within one semester. OBJECTIVE: Engage at least 200 students in our therapeutic arts classes during the 2017 academic year.

## 2. Project Activities

PROJECT ACTIVITIES: Engage students creatively in Performing Arts (75 students), Theater Production (12 students), Music (100 Students), Fine Arts (25 Students), or Ceramics (12 Students), thereby increasing their sense of achievement and self-esteem, all while having fun.

## 3. Expected Outcomes

EXPECTED OUTCOMES: We expect at least 150 students (75%) in our arts classes will demonstrate a reduced rate of disruptive behavior, an increased ability to collaborate with fellow students, improved attendance and improved academic performance, thereby making progress towards IEP goals.

#### 4. Evaluation

Using Vista Del Mar's TIER client tracking system, track each child's progress towards the goals documented in his or her individualized IEP, that progress is noted on the IEP. Vista Del Mar's Therapeutic Arts Program is an ongoing program at Vista Del Mar. All classes are offered as electives throughout the academic year, which coincides with the LAUSD academic year. Depending upon the class, up to seven class periods of a particular art form (music, for example) may be offered each day. Results of the program will be measured following each school semester.

Although several other agencies in the community have non-public schools (Kayne-Eras, Hillsides, Optimist Youth Homes, Five Acres) none have made the commitment to a therapeutic arts program we have. Our community partners are the 20 public school districts from which our students are referred. Due to the challenging nature of the children we serve, volunteers are not used in this program. However, volunteers/mentors are used in our therapeutic residential program.

Vista Del Mar's Therapeutic Arts Enrichment Program is now in its 10th year. During that time, it has been funded solely by private donations and foundations, due to the fact that public school funding does not cover such programs. This situation is unlikely to change, and Vista's Development Department plans to continue active fundraising for the foreseeable future. However, in recent years we have sought larger gifts to endow portions of this program, which should reduce the annual amount we need to raise.

Fueled by a desire to provide excellent support to special education students and families, Didi accepted the position of Assistant Director of Special Education within ICEF where she created the Specialized Academic Instruction (SAI) program to complement the resource program and address the needs of diverse learners.

## Notes:

The back-to-back deficits experienced by Vista Del Mar in the 2015 and 2016 fiscal years resulted from a combination of unusual circumstances that should not happen again. In 2015, the agency made the decision to exit a pension plan that benefit only about one third of our employes. Unfortunately, we had to contribute a large sum to the plan to keep the fund viable for those employees who were already enrolled in it. In 2016 we negotiated a higher rate of reimbursement from the Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD), the primary referring agency for our school. During the Arbitration for the higher rate, LAUSD referred no students to our school (per policy), so our population, and therefore our income, dropped. We managed to negotiate a higher rate, and we expect this deficit to disappear as our school population increases.


