2020 S.L. Gimbel Foundation Fund APPLICATION Narrative

I. Organization Background

Since 1945, the Idaho Humane Society has successfully pursued a mission to advocate for the welfare and responsible care of animals, protect them from neglect and cruelty, and promote humane education, awareness and compassion. The largest animal shelter and veterinary charity hospital in the Inland Northwest, IHS is governed by a 19 person volunteer board, employs approximately 120 people, and has a strong volunteer program with over 1,000 participants. IHS's annual operating budget of \$7.7 million is diversified and stable, with revenue split between adoption fees, medical clinic services, animal control contracts with local government, and fundraising activities.

Organizational Accomplishments:

In November 2019, IHS opened the doors of a brand new state-of-the-art 42,000 square foot Adoption Center and Veterinary Medical Center. The new facility is in a high traffic, high visibility location, directly located on a major thoroughfare located in the population center of the Boise Metro Area. The new facility was designed and built to meet our vision of a shelter that is an appealing environment for adopters and an expansive hospital that is state of the art. The new facility adds significant lifesaving capacity and capabilities to our existing 26,000 square foot shelter and hospital that the organization also continues to operate.

Program Activities:

- Open Admission Animal Shelter: We receive over 11,000 animals annually including over 1,200 animals
 facing euthanasia at other shelters. We provide medical care and connect them to their forever homes
 through adoption.
- Humane Education: Over 7,000 children participate in our programs annually including learning camps, classroom visits and programs.
- Veterinary Medical Center: We provide nearly 10,000 spay and neuter surgeries each year along with internal medicine and surgery for nearly 20,000 local pet owners, the majority of which are low income based on Federal guidelines.
- Humane Enforcement: We provide animal welfare law enforcement services including cruelty investigations to a jurisdiction totalling nearly one quarter of Idaho's population.
- Pet Food Pantry: Our program is a safety net for pet owning families and individuals facing economic hardship. Each year, we distribute over 50,000 pounds of food annually in collaboration with Meals on Wheels.
- Volunteer Program: Over 1,000 volunteers dedicate their time to us, donating over 26,000 hours each year. They are the backbone of our organization and work at every single level of our shelter.

II. Project Information:

A) Statement of Need

People living in under-served communities characterized by systemic poverty and structural inequity face barriers to affordable veterinary and pet wellness services similar to the challenges people in such communities experience in accessing healthy food, education, jobs, health care and housing. The Duck Valley Indian Reservation was established in the 19th century for the federally recognized Shoshone-Paiute Tribe. It is one of the most isolated communities in the intermountain western region of the United States, located in the vast high desert directly on the state line between Idaho and Nevada. The reservation is almost evenly divided in land area between the two states. A resident population of 1,309 persons was reported in the 2010 census. As of 2011, the Shoshone-Paiute Tribes had an unemployment rate of 40 percent. This rate is double the average of the rest of the United States.

The only significant community on the reservation is Owyhee, Nevada, which is nearly equidistant from the two nearest major cities: 98 miles north of Elko, Nevada, and 97 miles south of Mountain Home, Idaho. The distance to the nearest metropolitan area, Boise, Idaho, is 140 miles. Boise is the closest community to the reservation with a significant open admission large capacity animal shelter, including veterinary resources and high volume pet adoption programs.

Geographic isolation, low population, and low per-capita income make maintaining a veterinary practice economically impossible on or in proximity to the Duck Valley Reservation. The closest private veterinary clinics are in Elko, NV and Mountain Home, ID. In terms of basic veterinary services to provide wellness care or spay and neuter surgeries, the community is entirely un-served.

Tribal authorities and animal welfare advocates have been concerned about companion animal issues that have existed for decades and remain unaddressed. These issues include a high proportion of resident dogs and cats that are unaltered and contribute to large numbers of free roaming and abandoned animals annually, a free roaming feral cat population, lack of veterinary wellness and other care provided to the companion animals belonging to tribal members, and the existence of free roaming packs of unsocialized dogs that are known to roam the reservation.

Annually, the Duck Valley Housing Authority, which administers Federally funded housing for 231 households on the reservation, conducts an annual door to door removal of any pets in a household that exceeds a 2 pets per household limit. Having no access to humane euthanasia, the excess animals are each year taken to a landfill pit and shot with firearms. During the year, it is a common practice for tribal authorities to destroy free roaming dogs and cats by gunshot.

The Duck Valley Indian Reservation has a desperate need for access to spay and neuter and basic veterinary wellness care to alleviate companion animal overpopulation and suffering.

B) Project Description

Companion animal wellness goes hand-in hand with the wellness of animals' human caregivers. Providing services to disadvantaged communities, such as the Duck Valley Reservation, that have not been reached represents a vast opportunity to significantly improve companion animal welfare and in turn, foster humane values and enhance the quality of human lives as well.

Providing needed spay and neuter surgeries to a large proportion of companion animals living on the reservation, in cooperation and with the assistance of local tribal government, will end the continuing cycle of overpopulation, abandonment, lethal culling, and suffering from disease and neglect that has persisted in this community for decades. Treatment of parasites, vaccination, and other veterinary care will improve the health and welfare of resident pets.

Re-homing of surplus animals will provide a humane and non-lethal alternative and assist the Idaho Humane Society (IHS) adoption program in which our local residents are encouraged to adopt pets from shelters. Marketing of pets from the Shoshone Paiute Reservation will help promote awareness of this animal welfare crisis and humane values.

Utilizing the IHS network of committed volunteers for transport efforts will be a cost saving and effective method of transporting pets for surgery, veterinary care and re-homing.

This project is unique in that if implemented, it will be the first time that a comprehensive approach has been made to address the animal overpopulation and associated animal welfare issues that exist on the Duck Valley Shoshone Paiute Reservation.

C) Project Goal, Objectives, Activities & Expected Outcomes

- 1. Project Goal: The majority of pets housed under the administration of the Duck Valley Indian Reservation are sterilized, provided parasite treatment, and vaccinated.
- 2. Project Objective: Spay or neuter, provide parasite treatment, and vaccinate 300 dogs/puppies and 216 cats/kittens from the Duck Valley Indian Reservation.

3. Project Activities:

- Conduct 12 transport trips to the Duck Valley Indian Reservation to transport an average of 43
 dogs and cats per trip to IHS and return an average of 22 dogs and cats per trip to owners on the
 Reservation.
- Provide DHPP and Rabies vaccinations to 300 dogs/puppies. Provide FVRCP vaccinations to 216 cats/kittens.
- Spay or neuter 300 dogs/puppies and 216 cats/kittens at the IHS Veterinary Medical Center.
- Adopt to new homes cats/kittens and dogs/puppies not returned to owners on the Duck Valley Indian Reservation.
- 4. Expected Outcomes: IHS will sterilize and provide parasite treatment and vaccinations to 516 animals from the Duck Valley Indian Reservation by the end of May, 2021.
- 5. Evaluation: Comprehensive medical records and numbers of procedures will be recorded in the IHS veterinary management system to track number of surgeries, vaccinations and parasite treatments performed. We will record the completions of spay and neuter surgeries for 516 pets, vaccinations to 516 pets, and the transport of 516 pets originating on the Reservation.

D) <u>Timeline</u>:

Coordination with Tribal Authorities will begin in May 2020 with transports beginning in June 2020. Transports will occur approximately every 4 weeks for 12 months.

E) Target Population:

The impact of the project will benefit the entire estimated 1,300 resident population of the Duck Valley Indian Reservation. The project will be focused on the 231 households provided housing through the Duck Valley Housing Authority.

The target population of dogs and cats estimated to live in the Duck Valley Housing Authority residences and the number of unaltered pets is based on average household pet ownership statistics provided by the American Veterinary Medical Association, The American Pet Products Association, and the Humane Society of the United States.

F) Projects in the Community:

The Indian Health Services, which is active on the Reservation, is concerned about the impacts of unaddressed animal welfare needs including sanitation, protection from dog bites, and the mental health impacts from exposure to animal neglect and abandonment. There are no other service providers operating on the Reservation to address companion animal issues. The Idaho Humane Society is working in collaboration with the Duck Valley Tribal Council, Indian Health Services, Duck Valley Tribal Housing Authority, and Shoshone Paiute Tribe volunteers. Additionally, the Idaho Humane Society currently maintains a volunteer program which numbers over 1,000 volunteers. Volunteers at the Idaho Humane Society fulfill various roles in every department. It is common for the IHS to utilize volunteers for transport of animals across Idaho.

G) Use of Grant Funds:

Funds will be used to:

- 1. Transport dogs and cats from the Shoshone Paiute Duck Valley Indian Reservation to the idaho Humane Society Veterinary Medical Center and Adoption Center.
- 2. Provide spay and neuter surgeries, basic vaccinations including Rabies vaccines, and necessary wellness care including treatment for parasites.
- 3. Return transport of owned animals that have been sterilized and treated back to owners on the reservation.
- 4. Re-home surplus animals originating from the reservation through adoptions.

III. Project Future

A) Sustainability

Community awareness and support for the program will be provided through the extensive outreach program that the Idaho Humane Society provides through its heavily patronized facilities, and the extensive reach of the organization through social media, the press, and its website. Various programs have been started by the IHS through foundation provided seed funds and subsequently have been maintained through continued grass roots and corporate philanthropic support. A notable example is the Inmate Dog Alliance Project of Idaho which since 2006 has provided behavioral modification training to shelter dogs housed at Idaho correctional facilities. Following a similar model, dogs rescued through the Duck Valley Indian Reservation Project will be promoted at our adoption facility and branded as "Sho-Pai Pets". Our intent is to adopt these pets with both an added fee and donation request that will be restricted for future use by the project. Additionally, we will continually solicit funds as needed from our many corporate and individual supporters. Additional grants will be pursued and the Shoshone Paiute Tribe has also offered to explore funding for the project through the various foundations and government agencies that support the Tribe.

IV. Governance, Executive Leadership and Key Personnel/Staff Qualifications

A) Governance

Idaho Humane Society has a nineteen member board of directors that serves in a governance role. The board evaluates and manages the C.E.O. and provides high level oversight of the activities of the organization and financial stewardship. Additionally, the board is heavily involved in fundraising for the organization and members are required to contribute financially to the organization. Standing committees include the Governance Committee, Finance Committee, Legislative Affairs Committee, and Executive Committee. The board of directors votes on key policy decisions which require a majority of a quorum of the members. The organization is governed by its bylaws and operates in compliance with the Idaho Non-Profit Corporation Act and all other applicable State and Federal Laws.

B) Management

The Idaho Humane Society (IHS) is the lead agency responsible for the proposed project. Key personnel include the Director of Shelter Programs and Idaho Humane Society volunteers to identify, recruit and transport client owned, as well as stray pets, between the reservation and the IHS facility. The IHS Shelter Medicine Director and veterinary staff will be primarily responsible for the evaluation, treatment and surgical sterilization of pets. The IHS Development Department Staff will be responsible for promoting and fundraising for the project. The IHS Adoption Center Staff will be responsible for the rehoming of pets transported from the reservation. One member of the Shoshone-Paiute tribes' governing tribal business council has been assigned to work with the Idaho Humane Society on developing the project. Additionally, representatives of the Indian Health Services and the Duck Valley Housing Authority are assisting in the program development and coordination. The IHS Shelter Medical Center is a 3,000 square foot hospital that primarily serves the shelter animal population at the Idaho Humane Society. The IHS Veterinary Medical Center is an 11,000 square foot full service public veterinary hospital that primarily serves local pet owners whose families fall below 85 percent of median income for the community.

B) Narrative:

Transportation Cost: The major impediment to providing veterinary services to the Duck Valley Indian Reservation is the community's remote location. Cost of transportation includes vehicle cost and fuel, staff includes a 10 hour per trip allocation (5 hours driving and 5 hours loading/unloading of animals, coordination activities and record keeping) of a staff driver (Animal Care Attendant) to accompany volunteer assistant.

Veterinary Examinations: All animals transported must be examined by an Idaho licensed veterinarian prior to treatment, vaccination and sterilization surgery.

Spay and Neuter of Dogs and Cats: Animals are surgically altered in our high volume spay neuter facility by a veterinary team consisting of a licensed veterinarian surgeon and two veterinary assistants to handle, anesthetize, monitor and recover patients. Surgical sterilization also includes the cost of drugs and supplies.

Vaccinations include the cost of vaccines (DHPP, FVRCP and Rabies) administered at the time of sterilization and treatment.

Fecal Examination and Parasite Treatment includes the cost of fecal microscopy to identify parasite organisms and the average per dose cost of a broad spectrum dewormer/parasiticide.


